CURBING SPEED: *Webster Police is keeping our neighborhoods safe*

Speeding vehicles continue to be an issue residents reach out to the Town of Webster and Webster Police Department to address frequently.

The Webster Police Department recognizes the importance of reducing instances of speeding and creating safer roads for residents and visitors of the Town of Webster and is taking preventative measures.

Webster Police has recently updated its speed trailer. With the updates to this equipment, the police

department is now able to conduct an extensive speed study to assist with targeted enforcement to address concerns.

Webster Police has added a section to their website that informs residents of the department's intent to address speeding concerns (outside of targeted enforcement) and describes the process for residents to submit a speed study request.

Once Webster Police Department

receives requests and compiles the data, they will determine the next location for the speed trailer. Each placement of the speed trailer would have a two-week duration. This process is subject to change. At the conclusion of the study, Webster Police will post the results of each location to the department's website.

The Webster Police Department is committed to working with Webster residents to make our community a safer place to live, work, and raise a family.


The first steel was erected in early February, setting the columns for the new mechanics bay. There is a large team of individuals working




diligently to ensure the construction of this 80,000-square-foot facility is completed efficiently and cost-effectively.





Challenger Athletics offered at Miracle Field continues to expand with the most recent addition of Challenger Lacrosse coming this spring. Through the support of the “Kids Miracle Making Club” with Steve Pellow and the generous donations from the Webster lacrosse teams, the pilot program is ready to launch.






DOG LICENSING

in the Town of Webster

All dogs residing in the Town of Webster for 30 days or more must be licensed, as required by New York State law and Town of Webster ordinance.

Webster residents can apply for a dog license at the Webster Town Clerk's Office by bringing in the proper paperwork from the dog's veterinarian.

After the application and appropriate certificates are filed and the license fee has been paid, the license will be valid for one year from the date of issue. Each dog is issued a permanent official identification (ID) number and ID tag, which is to be worn at all times.

The annual fee for licensing an unaltered dog is \$20 and \$10 for a spayed or neutered dog, payable with cash or check. Existing dog licenses may be renewed online. Registrations

must be renewed annually to remain compliant.

Why license your dog?

It's the law. New York State Agriculture and Markets Law requires dogs in New York State be licensed and wear their dog tag.

Easy identification. When wearing a license tag, dogs are easier to identify, enabling them to be reunited with their owner faster.

Health and safety. By requiring that a dog have valid rabies vaccination prior to licensing, a dog license helps to control and prevent the spread of rabies.

What paperwork is needed?

Proof of rabies vaccination: All dogs four months or older must have proof of a rabies vaccination showing the date of vaccination

and whether it is a 1-year or 3-year vaccine or a certificate from a licensed veterinarian stating why the life of the dog would be endangered by the vaccination.

Rabies vaccination clinics are held throughout Monroe County. The updated 2024 schedule is at the end of this article.

Spay/neuter certificate (if applicable): If a dog is spayed or neutered, a certificate from a licensed veterinarian must be presented at the time of licensing. Spay/neuter is not required however it does reduce the cost of the license.





WEBSTER PUBLIC LIBRARY: *fine free!*



Webster Public Library eliminated late fines on all materials effective January 1, 2024. Library Director Adam Traub explains the myths and realities of this exciting change.

Why did we eliminate library fines?

There are four main reasons that motivated the Webster Public Library to eliminate daily late fines. The first is that fines generally affect only those who can't afford them; this is why you see some countries charging speeding tickets as a percentage of your income, rather than a fixed amount.

The second is that research has shown that libraries who eliminate fines increase the amount of overall items returned to the library, meaning books don't need to be repurchased to replace those lost items.

Third, the amount of revenue brought in by fines has been decreasing over the last two decades; a recent study showed that fine revenue has decreased by over 50% since 2017. Part of that is attributable to the shutdowns in 2020; however fine revenue was decreasing long before that and as more of our collection is electronic, there are fewer materials that would incur fines in the first place.

Last and certainly not least, the amount of staff time (and therefore tax dollars) spent on collecting fines greatly outweighs the amount of fines collected as income. In fact, a recent study in the Monroe County Library System showed some libraries spent twice as much on staff time collecting the fines as compared to the amount of fines revenue collected. Why would we spend \$200 to collect \$100?


But aren't fines an incentive for people to return their items?

How does one measure personal responsibility as it relates to library

usage? I'd suggest the only way to quantify that would be to look at the number of on-time returns and the overall amount of material that gets borrowed and then returned to the library. Decades of research into the effectiveness of fines in relation to on-time returns has shown that eliminating fines does not significantly affect the proportion of on-time returns compared to late returns.

Fines only act as a disincentive to keeping books overdue for those who cannot afford those fines. If you have the money to afford \$0.25, is that fine really going to get you to return the book on time?

This library serves all residents of Webster equally. If a policy is in place that disadvantages one resident over another, it is the job of this library and the Library Board to investigate that policy so that we can serve Webster equitably.

Won't folks just steal books if there are no fines?

There are people who don't return materials all the time, fines or not. That said, the library will still charge people who borrow materials and don't return them after a long overdue period. In case it isn't clear: if you lose, damage, or steal an item from this community, you will be charged for a replacement.

What are the effects and expectations now that fines have been eliminated?

The research suggests that we should see at least three things:

1. A small increase in the average number of days an item is overdue,
2. A reduction of staff time invested in collecting fines (which outweighed the income in some studies as high as 2-to-1), and
3. An increase in the proportion of materials returned, as compared to the number of items charged out.


This article was written in late January and early February of 2024, which means we only have one full month of data so far. That said, here is a comparison of those data from January of 2022, 2023, and 2024:

In 2022, we saw that overdue items were returned 17 days after the due date, on average. While there was a slight decline in 2023 to 14 days, 2024 saw that average at 16 days. So, while we saw a slight increase from last year, it doesn't change dramatically from 2022.



2. Staff time on overdue items has certainly decreased, allowing us to focus on just those situations where staff attention is required.

3. In 2022, 1,034 overdue items were returned while 18,801 items were loaned. Compare that to 2024, where 1,570 overdue items were returned while 20,959 items were loaned. While we expected an increase in overdues returned, we did not expect that it would be so dramatic in comparison to our circulation changes: our number of items charged out increased 12% from 2022 to 2024, while our overdues returned increased by 52%.

While the library is still in the early stages of measuring what impact this change in policy had, early indicators seem to suggest that we're more effective at getting library materials – Webster's investment in its own education, entertainment, and enrichment – back into the building and on the shelves.
