A Message from the Chief of Police

I hope this report helps you understand the organization, and the men and women who make it what it is. Every day, we have officers on the road, 24 hours a day, to provide services that are essential to our community. Our goal is to provide as much public value as we can with the resources available to us, from both our internal resources and the additional resources that we have access to, through partnerships with county, state, and federal organizations.

In 2024, we continued our focus on improving the foundation of the organization so that we can meet community expectations and deliver service effectively and efficiently. Through the acquisition of equipment, increase in training, and improvement of personnel management tools, we are developing a culture that focuses on public value and job performance. The implementation of the new policy manual has helped officers, and first line supervisors quickly address policy questions through the mobile application on the department issued cell phones and test their knowledge with daily training bulletins. Our officers work in a mobile environment and now have the necessary tools to access resources and communicate effectively.

Additionally, a new performance evaluation system was developed with input from all stakeholders. The final product provides employees with formal feedback quarterly, and provides supervisors with more structure for daily observations and documentation. The addition of a new clerk has increased the ability to meet the demands of the discovery process and provide key support for the administration, including providing statistics for the performance evaluation process.

Our overall headcount was positive in 2024, however, maintaining operational staffing was a challenge with fluctuations due to temporary administrative assignments (when officers are not fully capable of performing the duties of the road patrol, pending internal investigations or discipline), the resignation of a recruit (March), termination of an officer (July) and the transfer of two officers to another agency (December). We also added two Webster residents as recruits to the police academy (June).

Finally, the Animal Control Unit has had an uphill battle managing care for found or seized dogs due to a lack of available resources in the community to house the dogs and rehome animals who have not been reclaimed. This has required creative thinking and improvised solutions to meet the current needs. Luckily, the Town of Webster was able to obtain a grant in 2024 to assist in building a facility locally. We are looking forward to a more permanent solution.

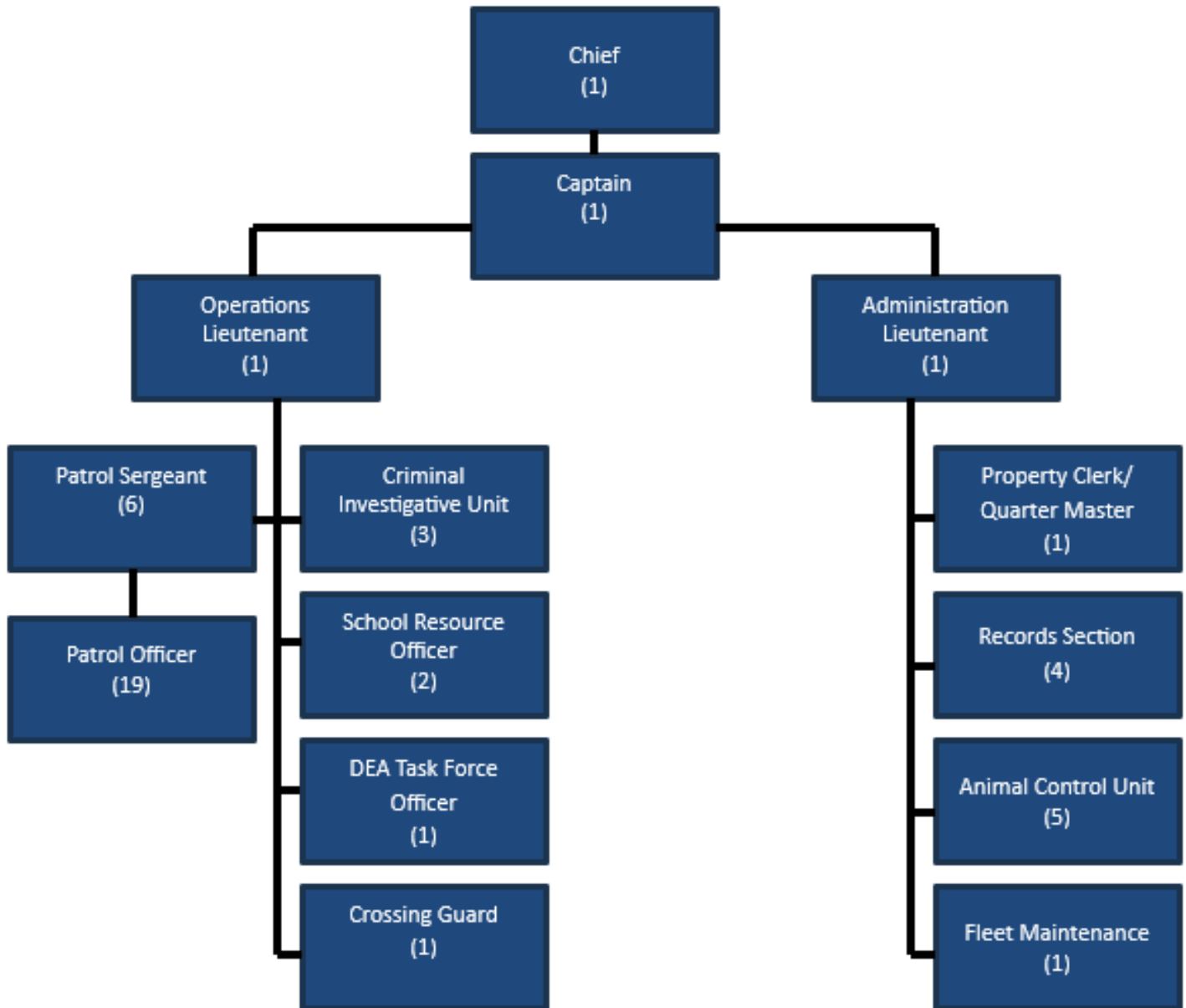

Pharmaceutical Drop-Off

In conjunction with the Monroe County Department of Environmental Services and the Drug Enforcement Administration, WPD organizes periodic pharmaceutical waste collections. This helps keep prescription drugs out of our water and out of your medicine cabinet. We did two off-site collections in 2024.

CVS has a pharmaceutical drug collection bin at their store located at 935 Ridge Road.



Special Attentions

Special Attentions are conducted at locations throughout town, needing extra patrol attention. Officers sometimes identify these areas through their patrol activities. Citizens also help us identify areas in need of extra patrol attention by sharing their observations with patrol officers and by requesting special attentions. In 2024, the Webster Police Department conducted **6,761** special attentions in these efforts. Special Attentions encompass a wide range of suspicious or dangerous situations such as traffic / speed complaints, building checks and other situations that seem out of the ordinary. Call 911 or stop by the PD to speak to an officer to request a Special Attention.

Sex Offender Notifications

The Criminal Investigative Unit coordinates the Sex Offender Registry Program. They are responsible for distributing notifications relating to sex offenders within town. Investigators regularly meet with individuals on the Sex Offender Registry for address updates, updated photos and other updates as required by New York State. If you have any questions about the Sex Offender Registry, please call 585-872-1216 and ask to speak to one of our SORA Coordinators.

Child Seat Safety Checks

Specially trained Webster Police Officers will install or check your child safety seat. Our Child Safety Seat Officers are available by appointment to talk to parents and caregivers about car seat selection, proper installation, maintenance and general safety guidelines. House Checks

The Webster Police Department continues to offer house checks when you are away from town. House check forms can be obtained in person at the Webster Police Department, or be found online through the town website at www.websterny.org. An officer will check the exterior of your residence and contact you right away if anything suspicious is found.

Department Awards

Day in and day out, our members go above and beyond to deliver service to the community. However, each year there are a few stand out actions that are worthy of special recognition. We have an awards committee that reviews the nominations and selects the appropriate award. The following section contains the awards presented for actions in 2024. Department awards are listed below.

Medal of Valor

This Medal is the highest award presented and shall be awarded only under the most extraordinary circumstances.

Criteria: The employee distinguished him/herself conspicuously by displaying great courage, above and beyond the call of duty, in the face of immediate life-threatening peril and with full knowledge of the risk involved. The act showed courage, judgment, and selflessness; and must have been performed for the purpose of saving or protecting human life.

Distinguished Service Award

The Distinguished Service Award may be presented to a member of the Webster Police Department, who intelligently and in the line of Police duty, distinguishes him/herself in the performance of an act of courage involving risk of imminent serious personal injury, with knowledge of the risk, for the purpose of saving or protecting human life; or who, in the course of an extended investigation of a nature, where he/she is continuously and singly exposed to grave personal hazard, willingly accepts such risk in the service of the department; or who performs an extraordinarily credible and unusual police accomplishment.

Life Saving Award

The Life Saving Award may be presented to a member of the Webster Police Department who, in the performance of his/her duty, renders medical First Aid of a distinguished or unusually credible nature to a person whose life is in immediate jeopardy, and does so in a manner that most certainly sustained the person and enabled such person to be delivered alive to a Medical Facility. The recommendation for this award must include a statement from the attending Physician, attesting to the fact that such person was in immediate jeopardy, that the medical First Aid rendered did sustain such person, and that the person would likely have expired without the said medical intervention.

Purple Heart Medal

The Police Purple Heart Medal may be awarded to a member who, in the line of Police duty, sustains a serious injury as a result of the behavior of another person; or, posthumously, to a member of the department who is killed in the performance of his/her duty. The Police Purple Heart may be awarded in addition to any other departmental award.

Commendation Award

The Commendation Award may be presented to a member of the Webster Police Department who distinguishes himself/herself by a meritorious achievement, act or service to the department, performed in an exemplary manner and in keeping with the highest expectations of conduct and performance.

Excellent Police Service Award

This Award may be presented to employees who have distinguished themselves by actions which are beyond those required for his/her position, which result in a significant contribution toward the betterment of the Webster Police Department/or its members.

Letter of Commendation

A Letter of Commendation may be issued by the Chief of Police or a Bureau Commander for instances wherein a member of the department shall be recognized for an individual act or performance of duty. These letters may be written to recognize actions that are commendable, but may not reach the criteria for another award and may be presented at any time.

Officer Ethan Parrish,

It is with great honor and appreciation that I present the 2024 Officer of the Year Award to Officer Ethan Parrish. Officer Parrish is recognized based on his competence, consistent commitment to public safety, and outstanding service throughout the year. Officer Ethan Parrish embodies the highest standards of law enforcement, demonstrating an unparalleled commitment to protecting and serving the community.

Throughout the year, Officer Parrish has consistently shown his competency and dedication to the department and our community. Officer Parrish has made several professional contributions to our department in 2024 to include Field Training Officer, Firearms Instructor, Defensive Tactics Instructor and Taser Instructor. Officer Parrish was awarded a Certificate of Appreciation by the Monroe County STOP DWI program for his efforts in combating drunk driving. Beyond Officer Parrish's professional duties, he has demonstrated a profound dedication to protecting the community from illegal drug activity and sexual predators that victimize underage children. In 2024 Officer Parrish made 29 arrests, 10 of which were proactive traffic stops that led to drug related charges, and 8 arrests that were for intoxicated drivers.

In the face of adversity, Officer Parrish has shown courage and determination. A few examples include: In July 2024, while training a new recruit, he responded to route 104 to search for a vehicle involved in a kidnapping where the suspect had two young children. Officer Parrish was determined to find the vehicle and ultimately located the vehicle in Wayne County. After a pursuit took place, Officer Parrish and his recruit, Officer Barnard, were able to safely take the suspect into custody and recover the two children.

In August of 2024 Officer Parrish responded to a severe motor vehicle accident at Holt Road and Ridge Road. A vehicle was traveling at a high rate of speed and collided with a utility pole causing it to catch fire. Officer Parrish and other officers arrived on scene, quickly assessed the situation and discovered the driver of the vehicle was still inside. Officers were able to suppress the flames with a fire extinguisher long enough for Officer Parrish and Officer Arseneau to pull the driver from the vehicle and move him to a safe location before the vehicle was completely engulfed in flames.

Officer Parrish exemplifies the values of integrity, bravery, and service. His outstanding contributions have left an indelible mark on the department and the community he serves. It is with great pride that we recommend Officer Parrish for The American Legion Law Enforcement Officer Award.

On behalf of the Webster Police Department, I am honored to commend you on your outstanding service and dedication to duty in the successful apprehension of kidnapping suspect, . Your quick decision making and unwavering commitment to public safety played a pivotal role in ensuring the two children involved were returned safely to their family.

On July 6, 2024, Officer Parrish and Officer Barnard were on patrol when they were made aware that the Rochester Police Department (RPD) was investigating a kidnapping case involving two children that were 8 and 4 years old. Further information was relayed that the two children were taken in a blue Chevrolet SUV with Pennsylvania license plates. One of the children in the vehicle was Facetiming with RPD and updating them on their location with the last update being State Route 104 and Salt Road. Officer Parrish and Officer Barnard immediately responded toward the area of the vehicle. Another update was given that the vehicle was passing the McDonalds in the Town of Ontario, in Wayne County.

Officer Parrish and Officer Barnard continued to search for the vehicle and eventually located it in the area of State Route 104 and Lake Avenue/State Route 21. Officer Parrish and Officer Barnard, along with a Wayne County Sheriff's Deputy and a New York State Trooper attempted to stop the vehicle with emergency lights and sirens but it failed to stop and a pursuit was initiated. During the pursuit, spike strips were successfully deployed and deflated the passenger's side tires. Additional units assisted and were able to box the vehicle in and bring it to a stop. The suspect was taken into custody without incident and both children were safely recovered and returned to their family. The suspect was charged with Kidnapping in the 2nd Degree, a Class B Felony.

On August 22, 2024 at approximately 0510 hours, Officer Parrish and Officer Arseneau responded to the intersection of Ridge Road and Holt Road for the report of a vehicle that struck a pole and was on fire. Upon arrival, officers located the driver unconscious in the driver's seat of the vehicle. While evaluating the situation, wires from the utility pole were knocked down, sparking and laying across the roadway. Both Officer Parrish and Officer Arseneau did not hesitate and suppressed the flames enough with a fire extinguisher to remove the driver from the engulfed vehicle. During this process, the vehicle and air were filled with thick heavy smoke. Parts of the vehicle were sparking and several explosions were occurring.

The driver was removed from the vehicle and pulled away from the fire to a safe location. Additional officers arrived and assisted with extinguishing the flames that were on the driver's clothing. Officers Parrish and Arseneau immediately began life saving measures and continued until the Webster Fire Department and Penfield Ambulance arrived on scene and took over. The driver was transported to Strong Memorial Hospital but unfortunately died from his injuries.

It is with respect and appreciation that I commend you for your efforts and teamwork during the arrest of [Suspect], on October 11, 2024. Thank you for your commitment to protecting the citizens of our community, especially our children.

On the morning of October 4, 2024, Officer John Storer began an undercover pedophile sex investigation using an online source. During this investigation, Officer Storer posed as a 14 year old female and began having a conversation with 30 year old male, [Suspect]. The conversation went on for about a week. Officer Storer utilized Officer Lindsay Thomas to provide photographs, phone conversations and video chats with the male. Over the course of the conversation, [Suspect] eventually expressed that he was interested in meeting the 14 year old female to have intercourse and use drugs.

On October 11, 2024 Officer Matthew Gumina, Officer John Storer, Officer Ethan Parrish, Officer Lindsay Thomas and Sergeant Timothy Brewer worked together to have [Suspect] drive to the area of the Linden Tree Apartments in Webster to meet up. Officers waited in the area and when [Suspect] arrived, officers quickly approached [Suspect]'s vehicle and took him into custody. Upon searching his vehicle, officers located marijuana, a male enhancement pill, condoms and a small amount of cocaine.

[Suspect] was charged with Attempted Rape 2nd, Attempted Luring a Child to a Vehicle or Building to Commit a Crime, Criminal Possession of a Controlled Substance 7th, Endangering the Welfare of a Child and Aggravated Unlicensed Operator 3rd.

For those who are not aware, our records management system (RMS), computer aided dispatch system (CAD), mobile data terminals and radio system are county-wide systems, funded by Monroe County. This helps improve communication among regional law enforcement partners and reduces costs for each agency. In 2021, we transitioned both our computer aided dispatch system and records management system to a new vendor. Statistical information displayed is a combination of data obtained from both systems. That is why you will see some disparities in data across the time period. I am continuing to add the new year to this data set with the understanding that systems and processes change over time. Operational staffing is an additional factor that is not represented in the data. With the nature of the work, we occasionally have officers out for extended periods of time for either training or work related injuries. Also, our hiring process is extensive and we have maintained a high bar when it comes to accepting lateral transfers from other agencies. Having a reduced operational staff has a direct impact on the self-initiated calls for service data.

This report is compiled data from 2010-2024 to give more historical context to the report. You will also see a breakdown of the calls for service into five categories. Those categories are Priority, Non-Priority, Self Initiated and Administrative. A general description of each category is provided:

Priority: 911 dispatched jobs that typically involve an element of in-progress activity.

Non-Priority: 911 dispatched jobs that typically are reports or after-the-fact calls.

EMS: 911 dispatched jobs for medical emergencies.

Self-Initiated: Calls for service generated by officer initiated activity. These typically include traffic stops, special attentions, and directed patrols.

Administrative: Calls for service that are generated to facilitate documentation of process or operational activities. Typically, these do not involve direct community contact.

Our road patrol consists of three platoons that work eight (8) hour shifts. Officers are assigned on a four day on, two day off rotation to provide coverage seven (7) days a week, 365 days a year. The platoon hours are broken down as follows:

1st Platoon: 10 pm to 6 am

2nd Platoon: 6 am to 2 pm

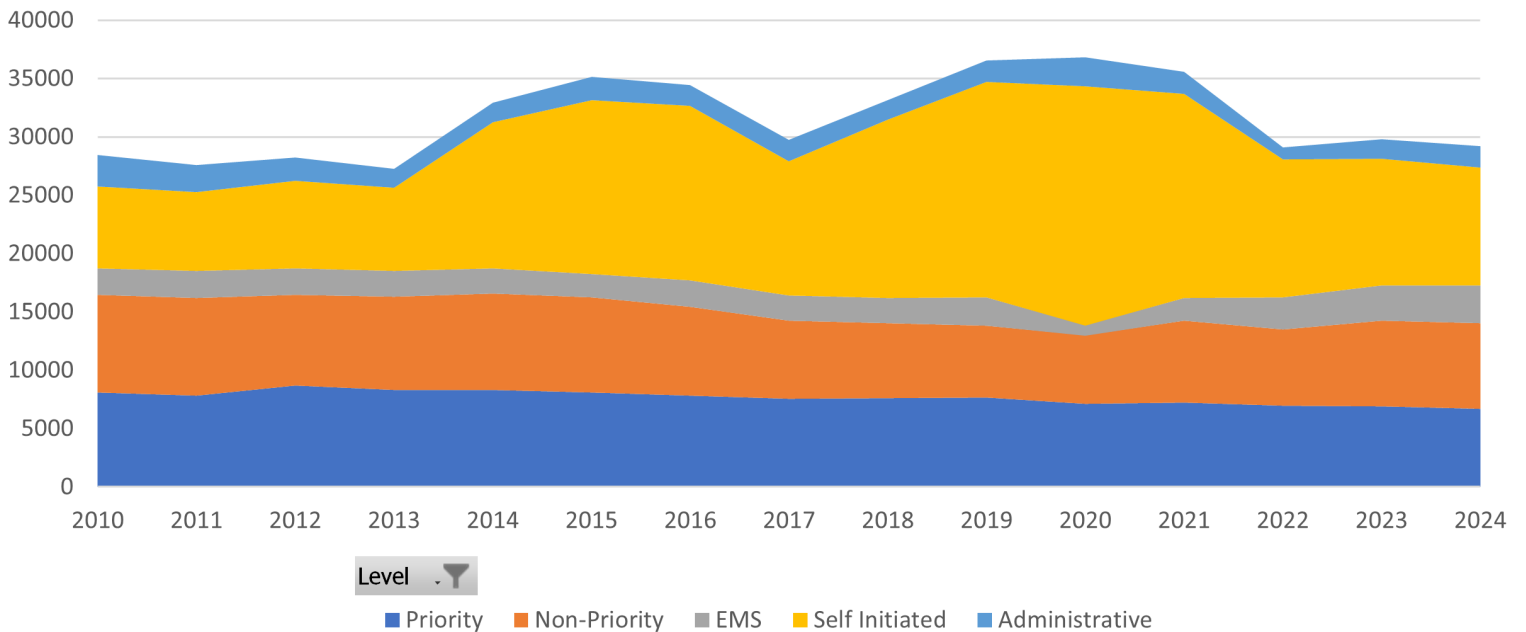
3rd Platoon: 2 pm to 10 pm

This graph shows the total number of calls for service generated each year. It is color coded to highlight what category the call for service is generated under. The 911 dispatched call volume is fairly consistent across the timeseries. The largest fluctuations are in the category of self initiated activity. This category is dependent on operational staffing levels. Over the years, the authorized head-count has fluctuated and long term disabilities have contributed to reduced operational strength. In 2022 specifically, dramatic changes to the organization, increased administrative process imposed by NYS with changes to discovery laws, and complexity of investigations (ie: impact of cell phones and video technology, body worn camera footage) have all reduced officers available time for self-initiated activity.

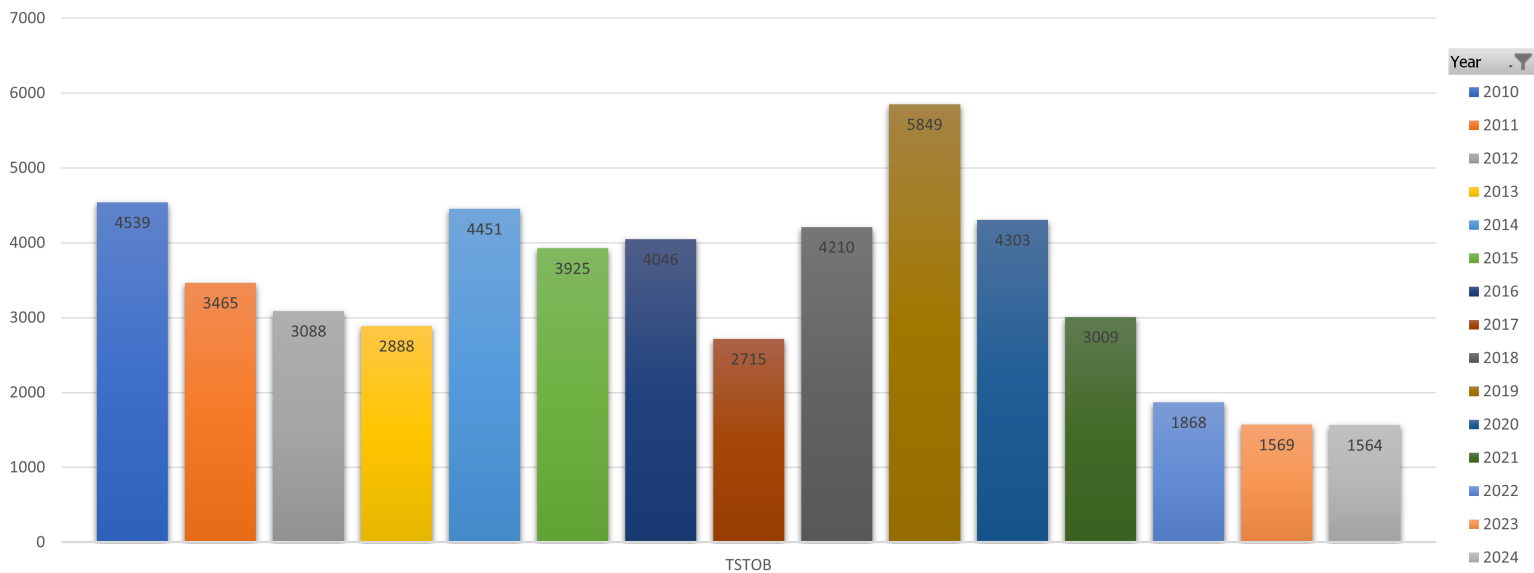

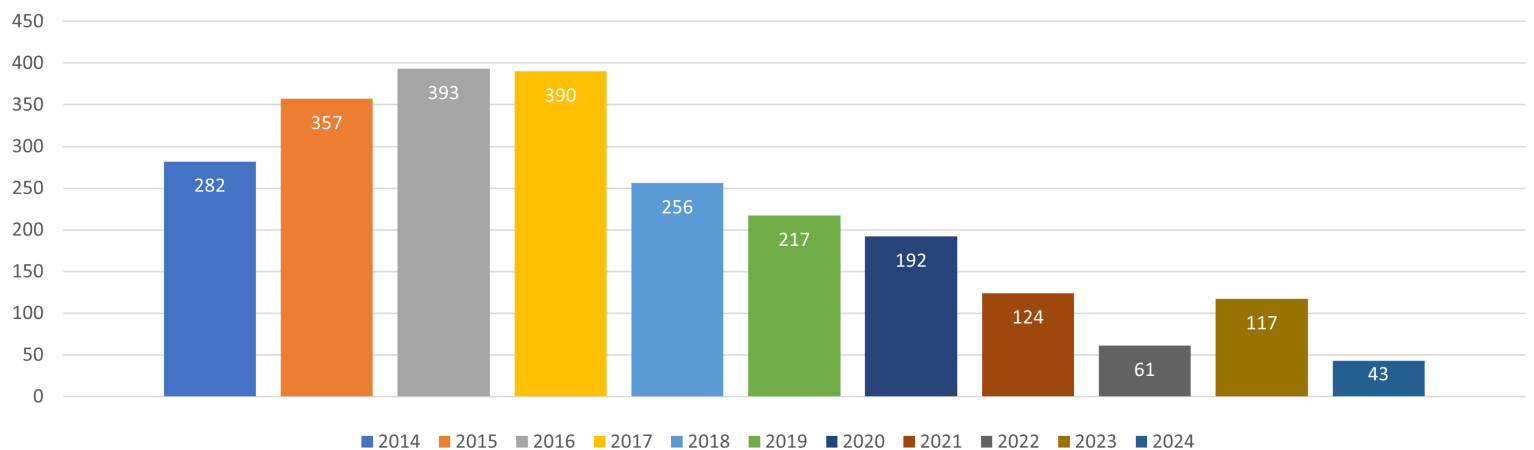

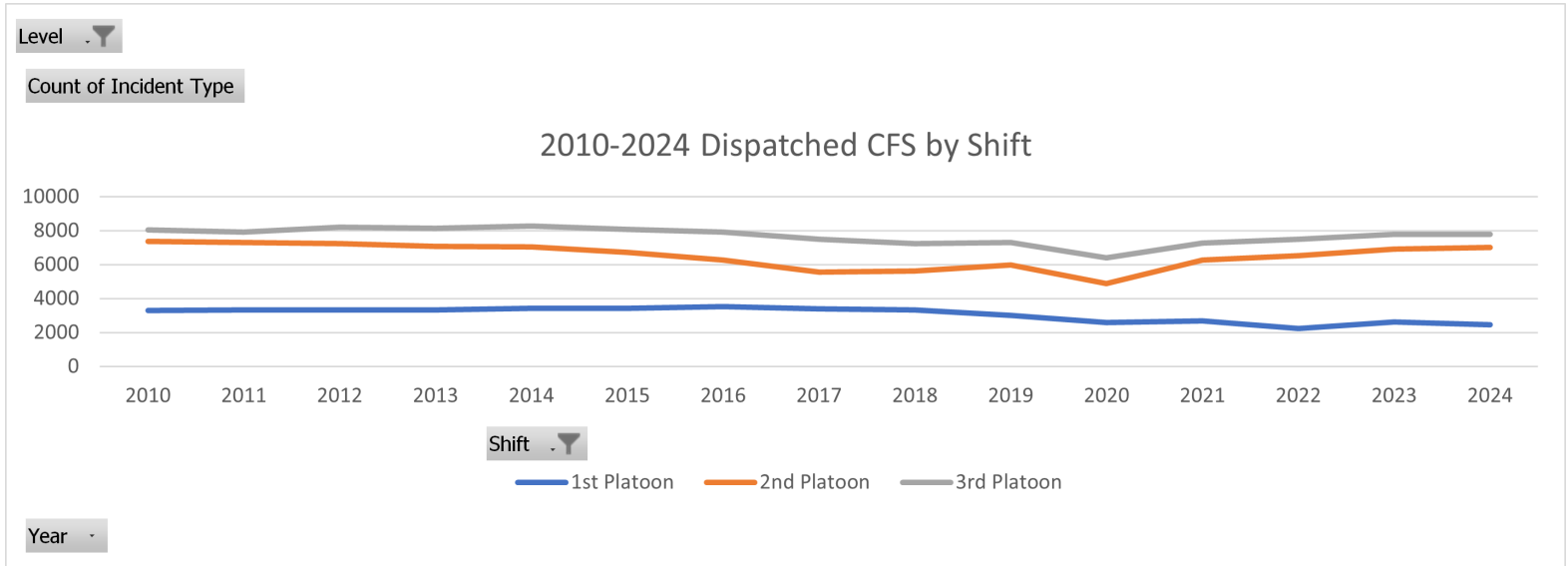

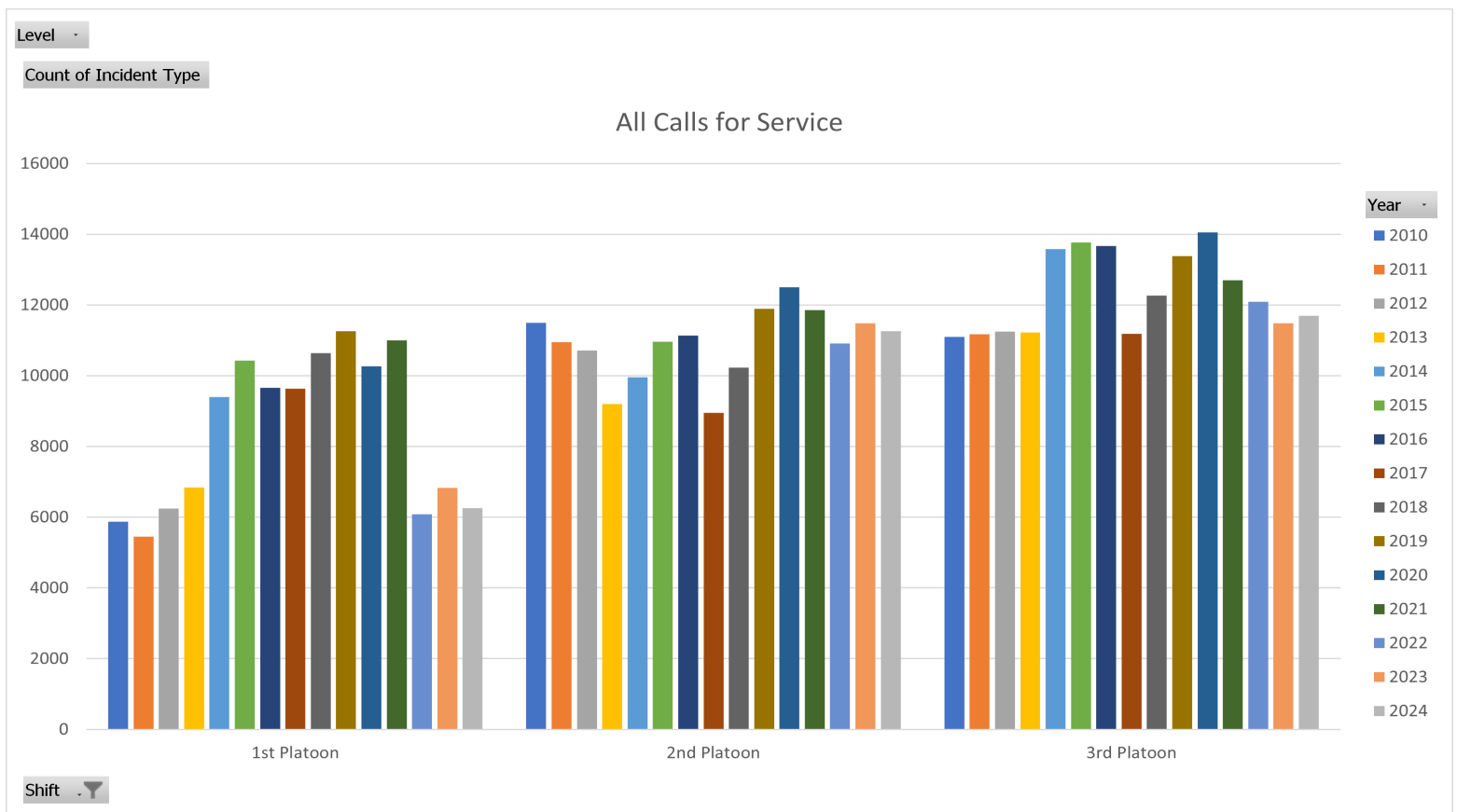

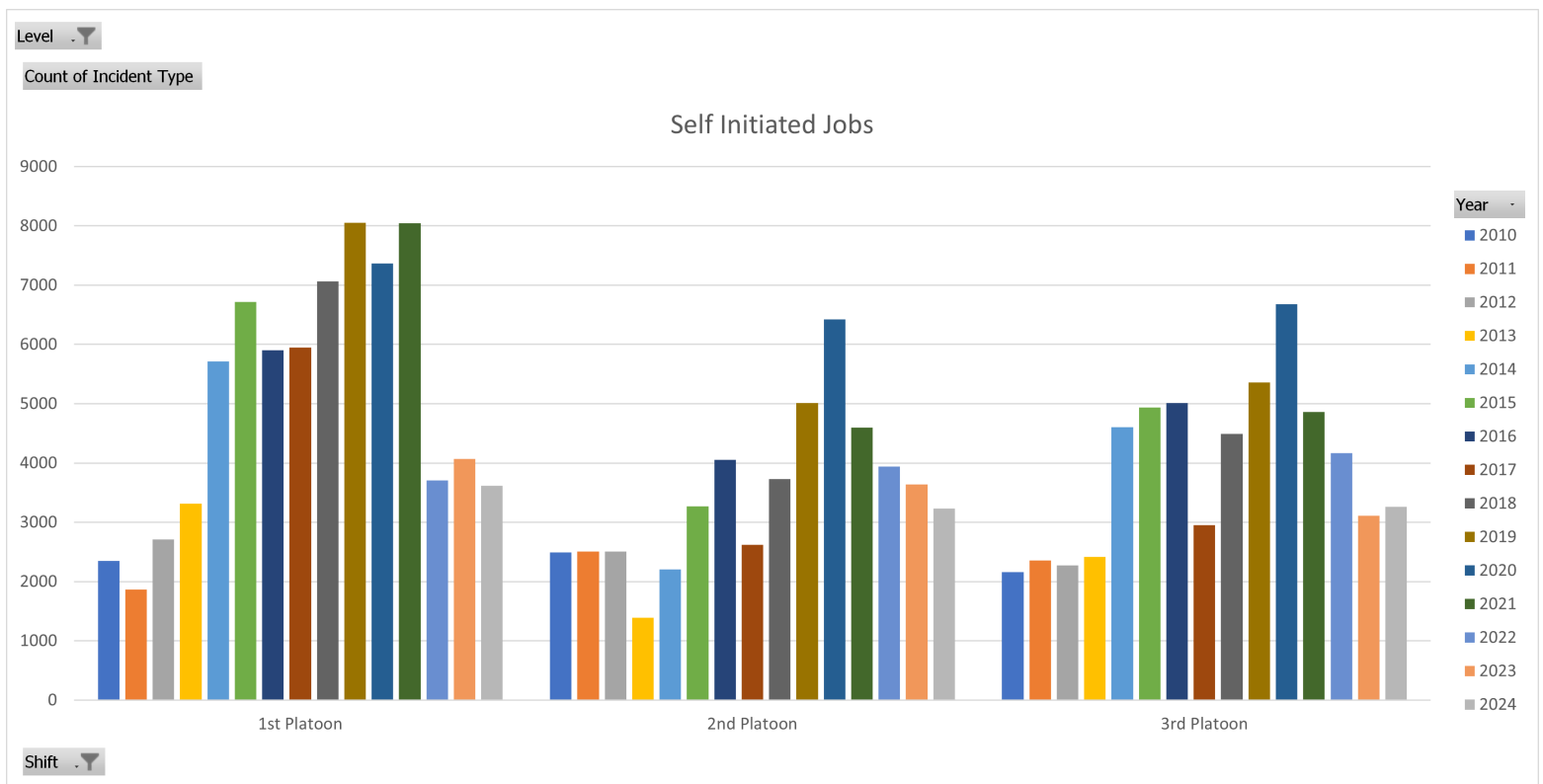
1st Platoon: 10 pm to 6 am

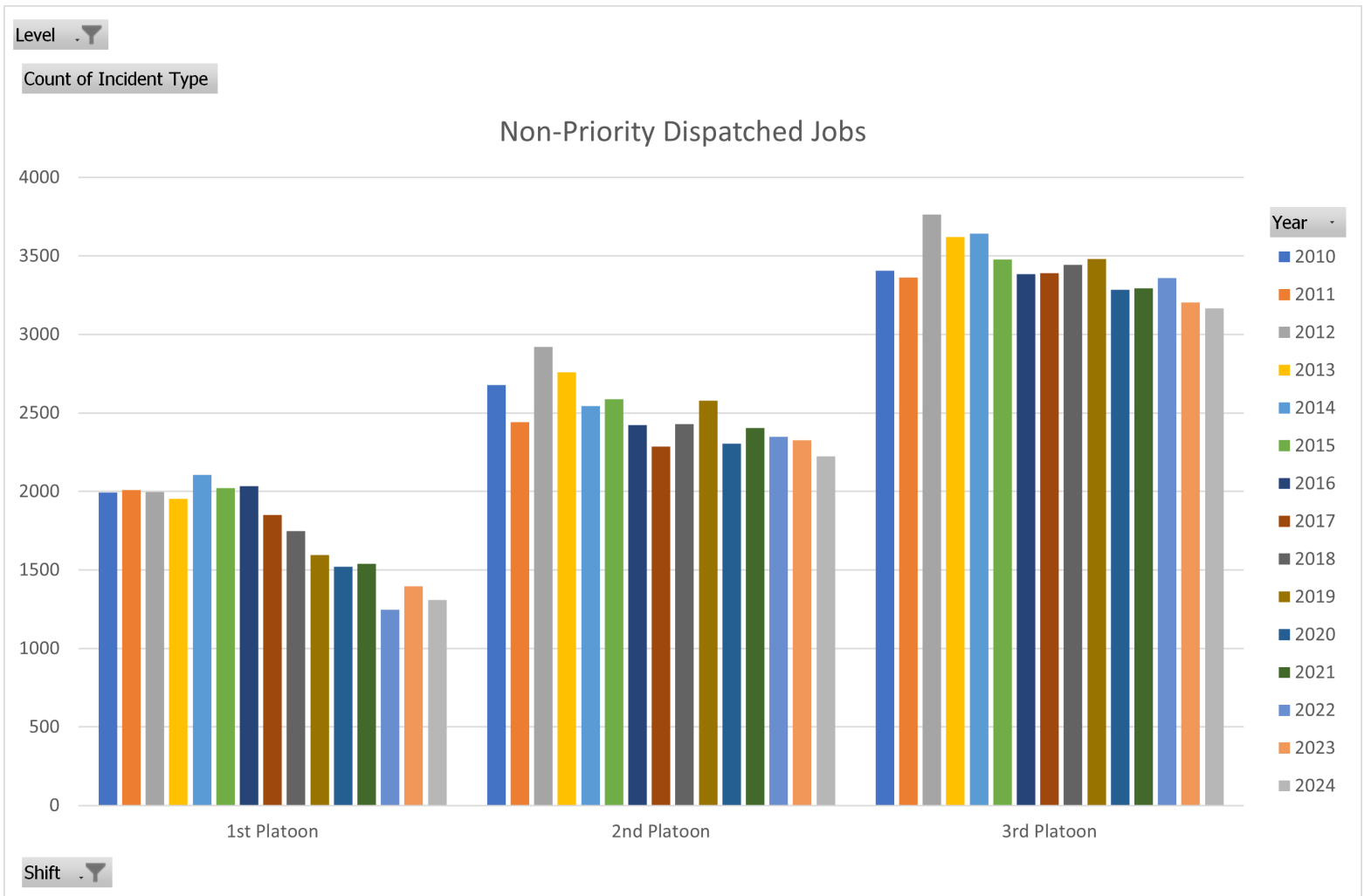
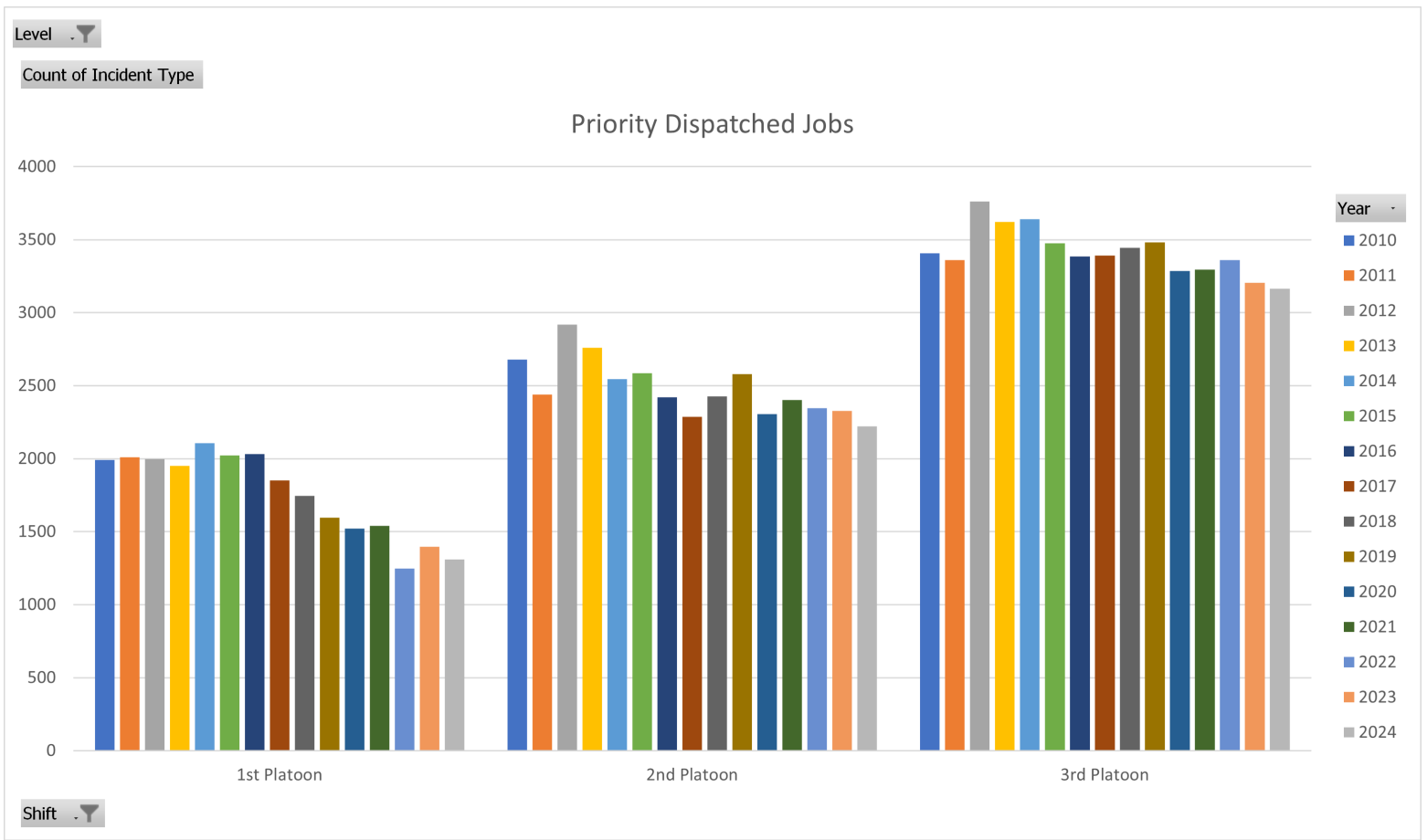

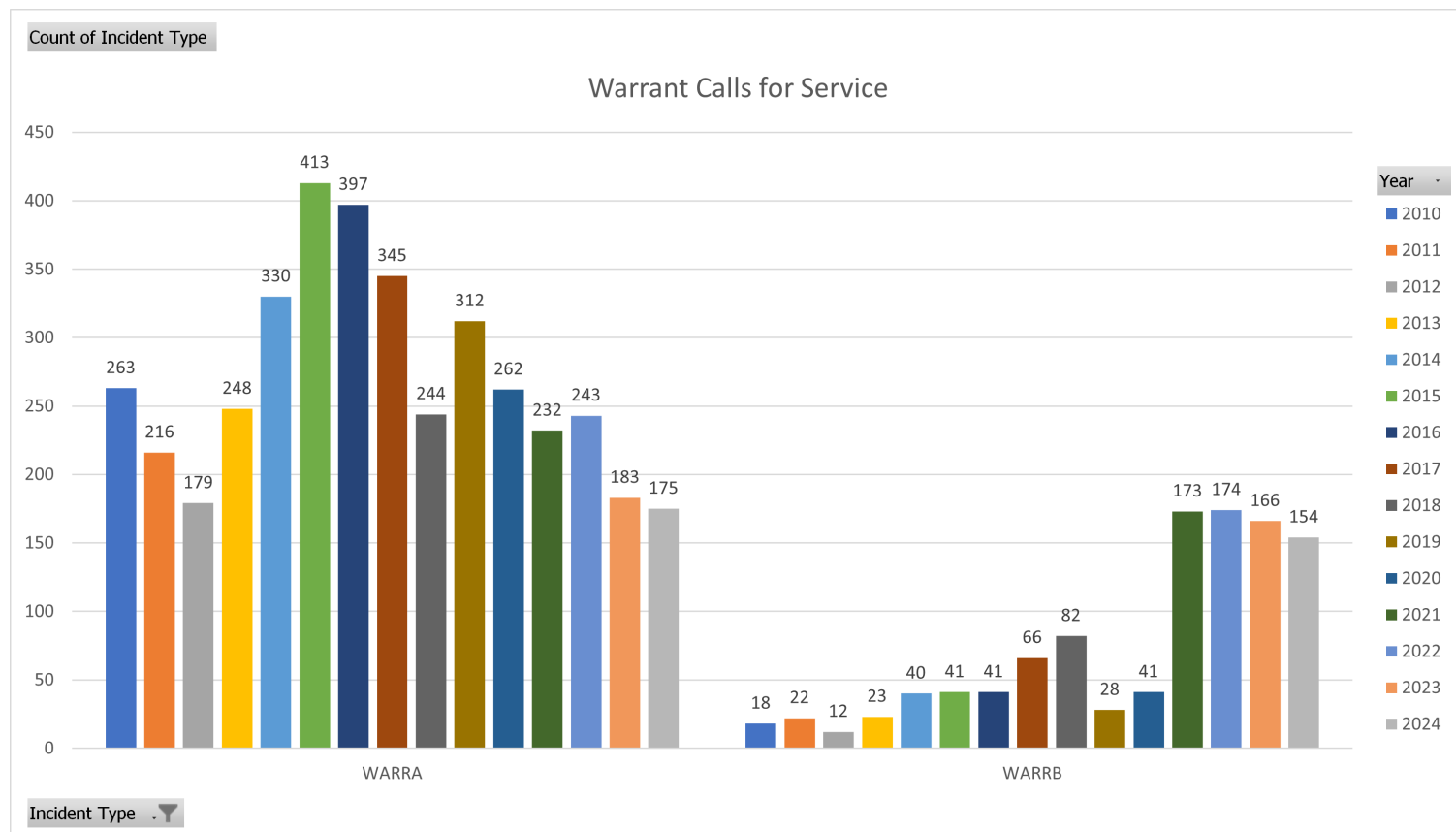
This graph shows the total calls for service by platoon for the 15 year period. The next three graphs will show the this data broken down into categories of calls for service by platoon.

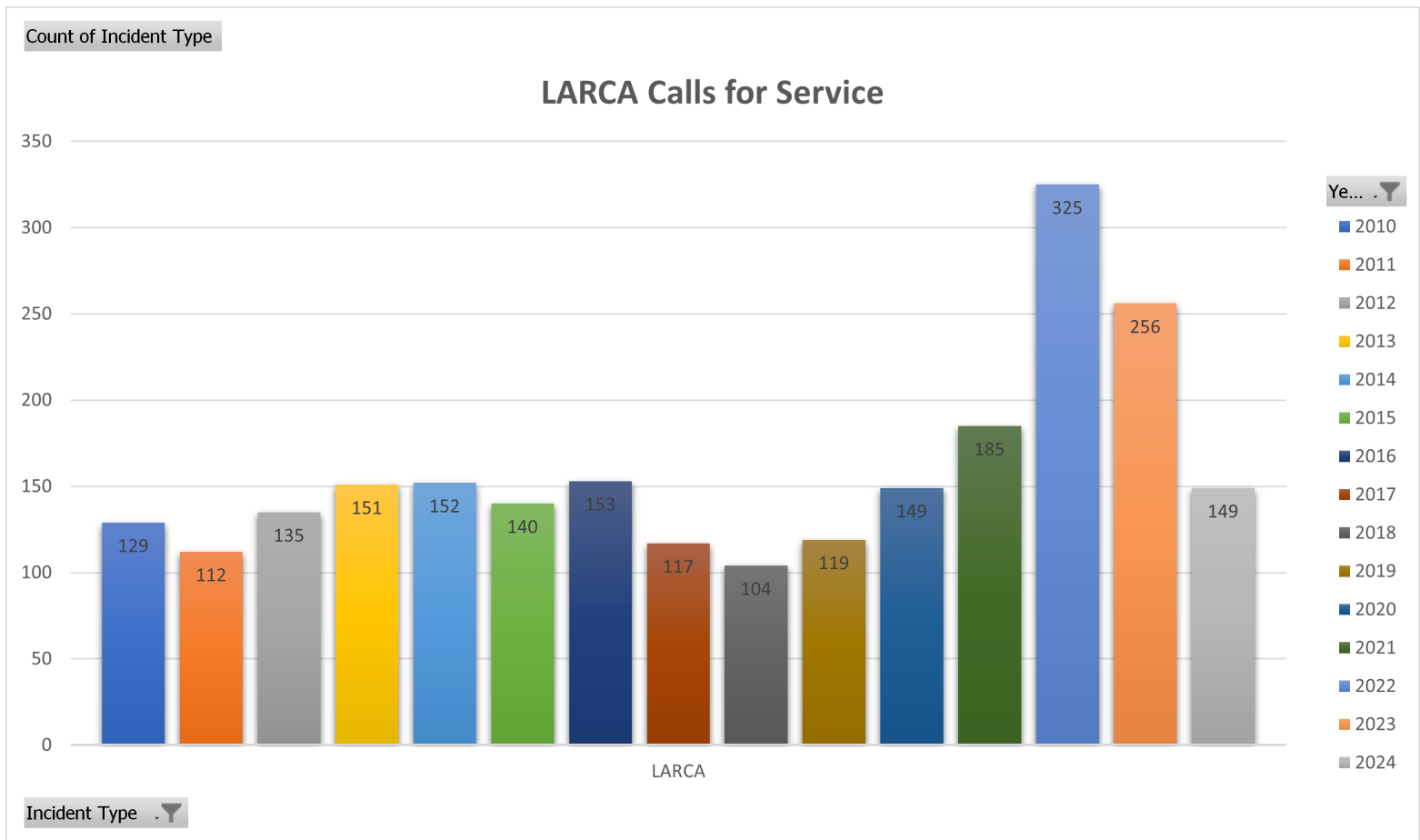




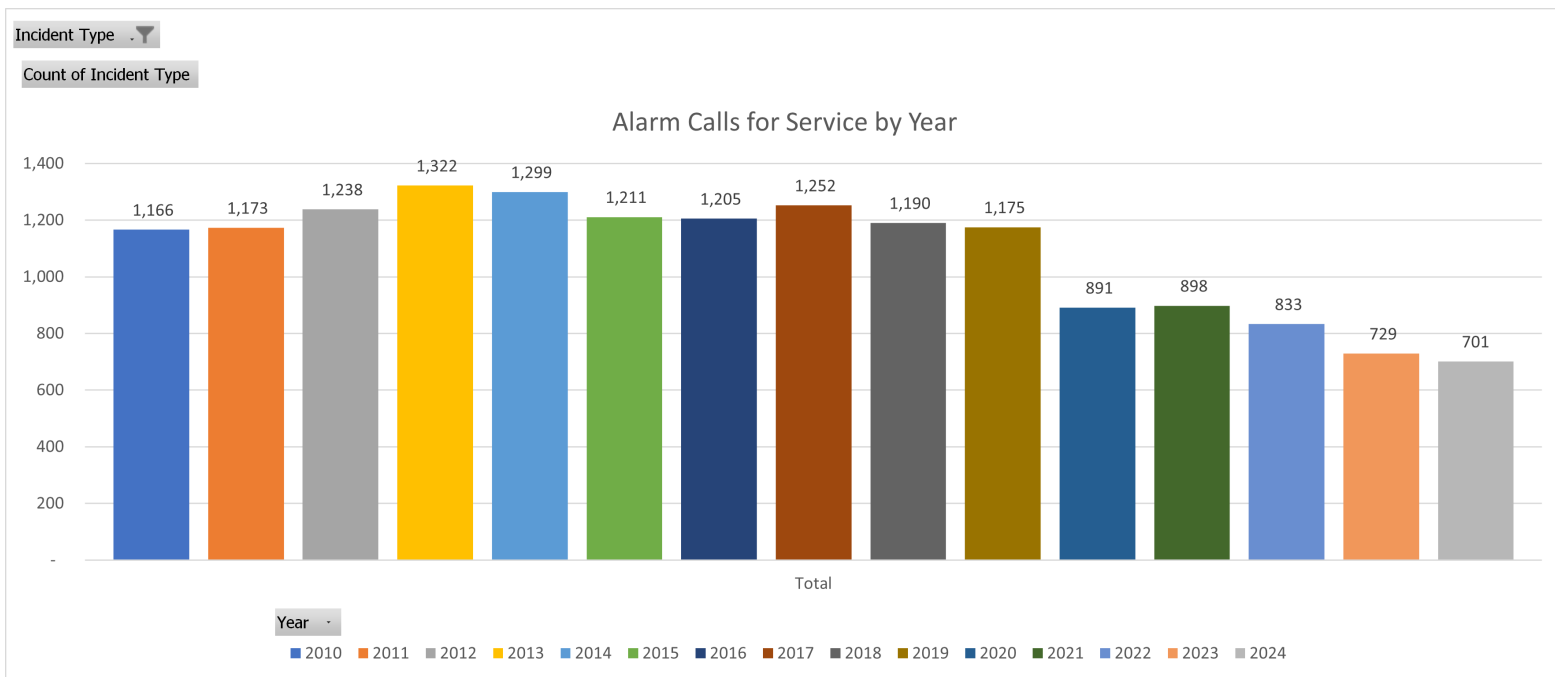


Warrants are issued by the Town of Webster Court and consist of both Arrest Warrants and Bench Warrants. Arrest Warrants are for individuals who are directed to appear before the court on a charge that they have not been arraigned on. The Bench Warrant is for individuals who failed to appear after being arraigned on the charge. The graph above shows a five year period of warrants received by the police department. The graphs below show the two types of calls for service associated with warrants. Generally, WARRA jobs are associated with warrant calls where the suspect is present or thought to be present. The WARRB jobs are for attempts to locate individuals with warrants. We have seen a large increase in the number of a warrants issued and the time/attempts it takes to locate them.





One of the major impacts to officer workload is the increase of in-progress property theft. This is primarily retail theft from a commercial business where an employee calls 911 to report that the crime is occurring at the time of the call. This type of response involves multiple officers, especially if the offender is located and arrested. Processing time for these type of incidents has increased dramatically with the incorporation of video technology from body-worn cameras, surveillance video both from the scene and other areas the suspect (s) may have been, along with changes to the discovery laws. Discovery is the process of turning over all case related material to the District Attorney's Office for disclosure to the defense counsel. You can see from the above graph that calls for larceny in progress has increased 140% above the average of the other years. These time-consuming investigations that occur almost daily, take officers from other duties such as self initiated patrols.



In 2001, the Town of Webster passed an alarm ordinance, Chapter 107- Alarm Systems, of the Webster Town Code. Its purpose being to protect and promote the health, safety, and general welfare of the residents of the town by reducing the number of avoidable alarms to emergency agencies. Avoidable alarms contribute to ineffective utilization of manpower and equipment, which may contribute to delayed responses to genuine emergencies. In 2022, we conducted a review of the process we were using to enforce the local law. We identified that we were not fully in compliance with the local law process and that we could improve our communication with the alarm user in an effort to reduce alarm responses before it became a civil penalty for the property owner. The new process has generated more direct communication with the owners and tenants (in the case of commercial property) but has also created some confusion. If anyone has concerns about communication they receive related to the alarm process, I encourage them to contact us at 585-872-1216. We are continually working to refine this process and achieve the goal of reducing unnecessary responses.
