To my Webster Friends,

The old adage reads: **"April showers bring May flowers."**

That saying may not always be applicable to Webster, since it is not unusual that we get snowstorms in April...but enough of that cynicism! Based on what we have all experienced the past two years with COVID, the eternal optimist in me sees **"sunny and 70 degrees this April in Webster!"**

Spring has sprung and from the feedback I have received from several people who have been in town for many years, this is as busy a time as we have ever seen in Town of Webster government. Why are things so busy?

There are probably a number of reasons but from what I have gleaned in my 2+ years as the Town Supervisor, I think the main reason is that Webster's

record growth in the 30-year period of 1990-2020 outpaced the Town Government's ability to stay up. That is not a criticism of the Town's leadership in the 1990-2020 time period, just the reality, in my opinion, of the unique challenges the Town of Webster had over **all other** Monroe County towns during those 30 years. In that time period the town's population grew by 50%, adding 15,000 people (approximately 30,000 people in 1990 to 45,000 in 2020)!

I am truly excited for the future of Webster!

I believe the leadership in place with our team of dedicated department heads in 2022 is destined for great things.

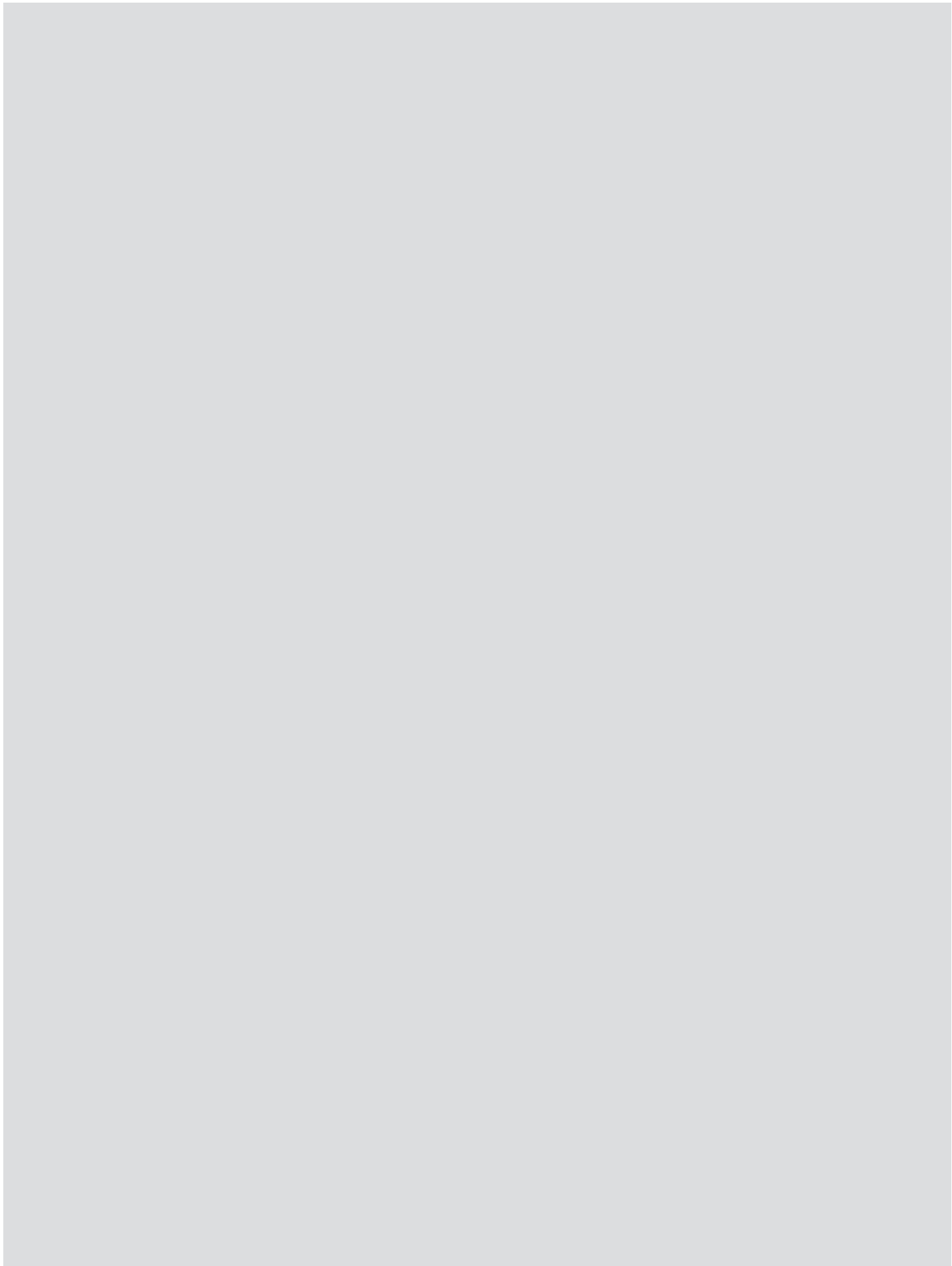

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECT UPDATE

DeWitt Road Elementary School library: Webster CSD students are sure to enjoy newly renovated elementary school libraries for years to come.

Dear One Webster Community,

I'm thankful for the opportunity to share a brief update on our school district. As you read this, spring may already have sprung! Around Webster CSD, construction progress has continued on the capital improvement project approved by district voters in December 2018. The project will improve our district's 11 buildings and bus garage, affording students greater opportunities to learn, grow, and thrive.

The following projects are a snapshot of what has been accomplished in our school district so far as part of this latest capital improvement project. There is much to look forward to as we continue to make these renovations and additions in our schools:

- Webster Schroeder High School's track and synthetic turf sports fields are complete, along with renovations to all bathrooms. Schroeder's library will also be finished this summer;
- Webster Thomas High School's technology wing renovation is complete which includes classroom additions and a new auto lab; synthetic turf baseball and softball fields will be ready for spring athletics;
- All seven elementary school playgrounds are finished, main entrance renovations will be finished by fall 2022, and window replacements were installed in some buildings, as well;
- Five of seven elementary schools' libraries have been completely renovated, with the remaining two slated for completion this spring and summer;
- Willink Middle School library renovations are in progress and on track for completion this summer; heating upgrades will also be made to Willink;
- Bus garage renovation and addition broke ground in February!

Lastly, a brief reminder to our entire community that this year's annual budget vote and board of education election will be held on Tuesday, May 17, at the Webster Schroeder High School gymnasium, 875 Ridge Road, from 6:00 a.m. - 9:00 p.m. I hope to meet many of you there as you vote on a proposed 2022-23 district spending plan and elect three candidates to the board of education. Please visit our website, websterschools.org/budget, for information about the proposed budget as we will continually add resources to that page prior to the May 17 vote.

Thank you to the One Webster community for all you do for our students and staff.

How to Keep in Touch with the Webster Police Department on Social Media

One of our areas of focus this year is to increase our footprint on social media to be more efficient with our communications.

Communication with your local police department is essential to having awareness of the issues that we are facing in town, to see what services your tax dollars are providing and to receive direct communication that is unfiltered or segmented in critical moments for up-to-date information.

To help accomplish this mission, your police department has been utilizing social media as a direct way to push communication out to the public. Historically, that effort has been focused on Facebook and for a limited time-frame on Twitter. One of our areas of focus this year is to increase our footprint on social media to be more efficient with our communications. We are going to accomplish this by expanding our social media platforms and designating officers to help contribute with content.

Facebook

We will continue our use of Facebook as a static platform to deliver content and allow for limited two-way communication. It is important to understand that this account is not monitored 24 hours a day and cannot be used for confidential communication, reporting of incidents or emergencies. 911 remains the official method for requesting police services.

Twitter

For those who are unfamiliar with social media, this platform is helpful to create an account and follow specific entities and does not require you post or interact to receive the information. It can be thought of as a direct news source. This makes it an excellent tool for a public safety agency to push out information in real time when an unfolding incident will have an impact upon the community. It is intended to provide one-way communication directly from the source.

Instagram

We also created an Instagram account to provide content that is more focused on photo and video sharing. Our goal is to share content that allows you to see the services we provide in a more visual format.

Our **Public Information Officer** is the primary point of contact for all media related inquiries and also coordinates our messaging to the public. In the past, they have been assisted with other officers who have assisted with monitoring and posting to our Facebook page. We have created a more formal process that now includes designated **Shift Media Officers**. These positions designate officers on each shift who have volunteered to help deliver information services to the public through our social media platforms.

In the late 1890's the citizens of Webster began to discuss the need for incorporation. This was badly needed to address road repairs, an improved water system, street lighting and the vital need for fire protection. In March of 1906 the Webster Village Board was approached by 15 citizens who desired to form a fire corporation. On March 23, 1906 the Village Board voted to accept the petition and the newly incorporated Webster Volunteer Fire Department (WVFD) was formed. The dedicated men and women of the WVFD have been faithfully serving the Webster community ever since.

Today the WVFD operates under the auspices of the North East Joint Fire District (NEJFD). The NEJFD encompasses 33 square miles, serves nearly 28,000 residents and is one of the largest geographical fire districts in Monroe County. The district borders are basically Hard Road and Shoecraft Road to the west, the Monroe-Wayne County line to the east, the Lake Ontario shore to the north and Atlantic Avenue to the south. Webster volunteer firefighters serve the community from three stations strategically located throughout the District. Station 1, the Enderlin Station, serves as District headquarters and is located at 35 South Avenue in the Village of Webster. Station 2, the Rose-land Station, is located at 1391 Salt Road at the corner of Plank Road. Station 3, the North Station, is located at 600 Phillips Road just north of the Xerox complex.

In order to provide exceptional fire-rescue services to our large fire district the WVFD supplies the trained manpower to operate the District's fleet. This includes 4 fire engine pumpers, 2

light rescue trucks, 1 heavy rescue truck, 1 ladder truck, 1 fire police-utility vehicle, 1 grass fire truck, 1 off road rescue utility vehicle and 3 command vehicles. Our volunteer firefighters also provide fire prevention services, school educational programs and, of course, organize and run the annual Webster Volunteer Fire Department parade and carnival. We are very hopeful that we will be able to see you at this year's parade and carnival (fingers crossed)!

Last year the WVFD responded to more than 1000 calls for service and our volunteers donated over 19,300 hours to the community. We are always looking for new volunteers to join our family. All of the required equipment and training is provided at no cost to the volunteer firefighter. Our regular training drills are held on Monday evenings with many other training opportunities available. All you need is the time to commit and the desire to serve. As a volunteer firefighter you will learn many important and useful skills, will make many lifelong friends, will truly be helping your community by providing essential emergency services and will have a lot of fun along the way. 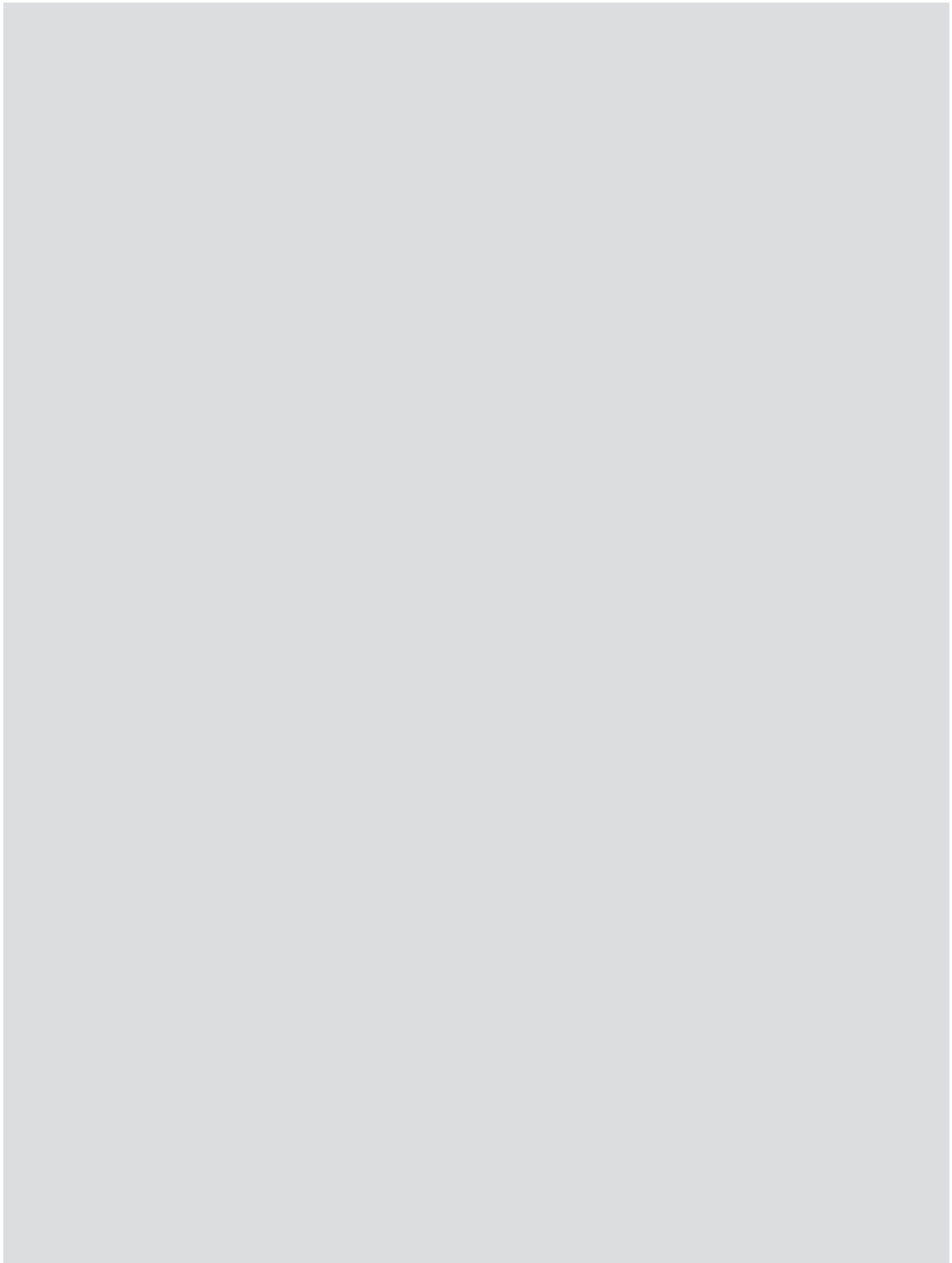

Previously, I served as the Associate Director of the Monroe County Library System supporting twenty member libraries, including Webster. For the thirteen or so years prior to that, I worked in academic libraries in the area. I am indebted to Terri, the staff, and the Board for building such a wonderful team and library.

On a personal note, this job is a bit of a homecoming for me. I was born and raised in Webster, graduating from Schroeder; my parents still live here and my brother and nephew are just across the bay in Irondequoit. If you would like to know a little more about me, we're planning an open house later in April; please do come if you're interested in meeting me or hearing a bit about our work this year.

In the past year, the library has invested in upgrading its HVAC system by leveraging Library Construction funds from the State, added new technology with the generous assistance of Assemblywoman Jen Lunsford, and hoping to update another section of lighting to LED to help both save on energy costs and make a more well-lit and welcoming environment.

While our team is working hard to make the best library possible, we still must look towards the future. The Board has set an ambitious goal to remove fines for all youth materials by the end of this year. "This move would not only make the library more accessible, but libraries that remove fines see both an increase in circulation and an increase in returns of material."¹

Furthermore, our neighboring libraries in Monroe County have already started this move: Rochester Public Library, Fairport Public Library, Irondequoit

Public Library, and Parma Public Library - and more are poised to do so over the coming years.

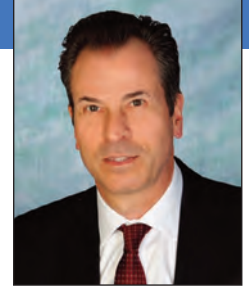

Webster's Utilization of American Rescue Plan Funds

As part of the American Rescue Plan, the US Government is distributing the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF). A total of \$350 billion dollars will be delivered to State, Local and Tribal governments. Thus far the following steps have taken place for the Town of Webster:

June 22, 2021	July 1, 2021	July 20, 2021	July 2022
Town submits request for funding with the NYS Division of Budget	Town receives confirmation of eligibility from NYS Division of Budget	Town receives the initial funding in the amount of \$2,017,194	The Town is expecting additional funding of \$2,033,666

The funds are being held as deferred revenue until they are expended. In the near future, the Town Board will be developing a spending plan for the funds.

The following qualify as an eligible use of the funds:

- Response to public health emergency & negative economic impact
- Replacement of revenue lost by the Town due to the pandemic
- Projects eligible through the EPAs Clean Water State Revolving Fund
- Modernization of information technology cybersecurity, hardware, software and protection of critical infrastructure

The initial project and expenditure report is due April 30, 2022. Stay tuned as the Town Board develops a plan to maximize the utilization of these funds.

Drafting Underway for Revisions to Shed and Fence Regulations

Public Hearing To Be Scheduled Prior To Any Changes Being Implemented

Unintended Consequences of Current Shed and Fence Setback Regulations:

- Limits residents' ability to fully utilize their backyard
- Creates 20' wide unkept "alleys" between neighboring fences
- Creates property boundary disputes/legal issues; delays real estate closings
- Requires residents to go through an arduous approval process, often requiring attendance at several zoning board of appeals meetings
- Aesthetically unattractive
- Residents opt to not obtain permit and install anyway
- Enforcement efforts are time-consuming; not an efficient use of resources

The Town of Webster has historically been one of the fastest growing communities in Monroe County. With continued growth, it is incumbent on a municipality to periodically review and evaluate their codes and regulations to ensure that they continue to make sense as a community evolves over time.

Webster's current setback regulations on 6' tall privacy fences and utility sheds is one area the Town's Department of Community Development recently evaluated.

Currently, a 6' tall privacy fence is required to be placed 10' from any side or rear property line and a utility shed must be placed at least 15' from any side or rear property line.

An examination of Webster's previous town zoning codes indicates that the shed regulation was first put into place in 1938 when the Town had a population of roughly 5,500 residents, or a population density of 164 people per square mile. The fence regulations were initially implemented in the early 1950's when Webster's population was just over 7,100 residents, or a population density of 213 people per square mile. These regulations seemed to fit the character of the community at that time, as Webster was primarily an undeveloped, agricultural farm town.

According to the latest census data, the Town's residential population in 2020 reached a total of 45,327 residents, with a population density of 1,351 people per square mile.

Under the current regulations, Webster residents seeking to locate a shed or fence closer to the property line than what is allowed by code must apply for a variance from the Zoning Board of Appeals. This requires residents to prove that they meet a set of legal standards necessary for the Board to be able to grant a variance from the code.

An analysis of other municipalities throughout Monroe County revealed that most other towns allow 6' tall privacy fences up to the property line and allow sheds to be within 5-10' from a property line. These less restrictive regulations maximize the available land that can be utilized by the property owner for other common back yard amenities such as decks/patios, swimming pools, gazebos, and children's playsets. More importantly, residents of those municipalities aren't required to go through a rigorous review and approval process to obtain a common accessory that is standard for residential back yards, which ultimately provides a better customer service experience to the resident or applicant.

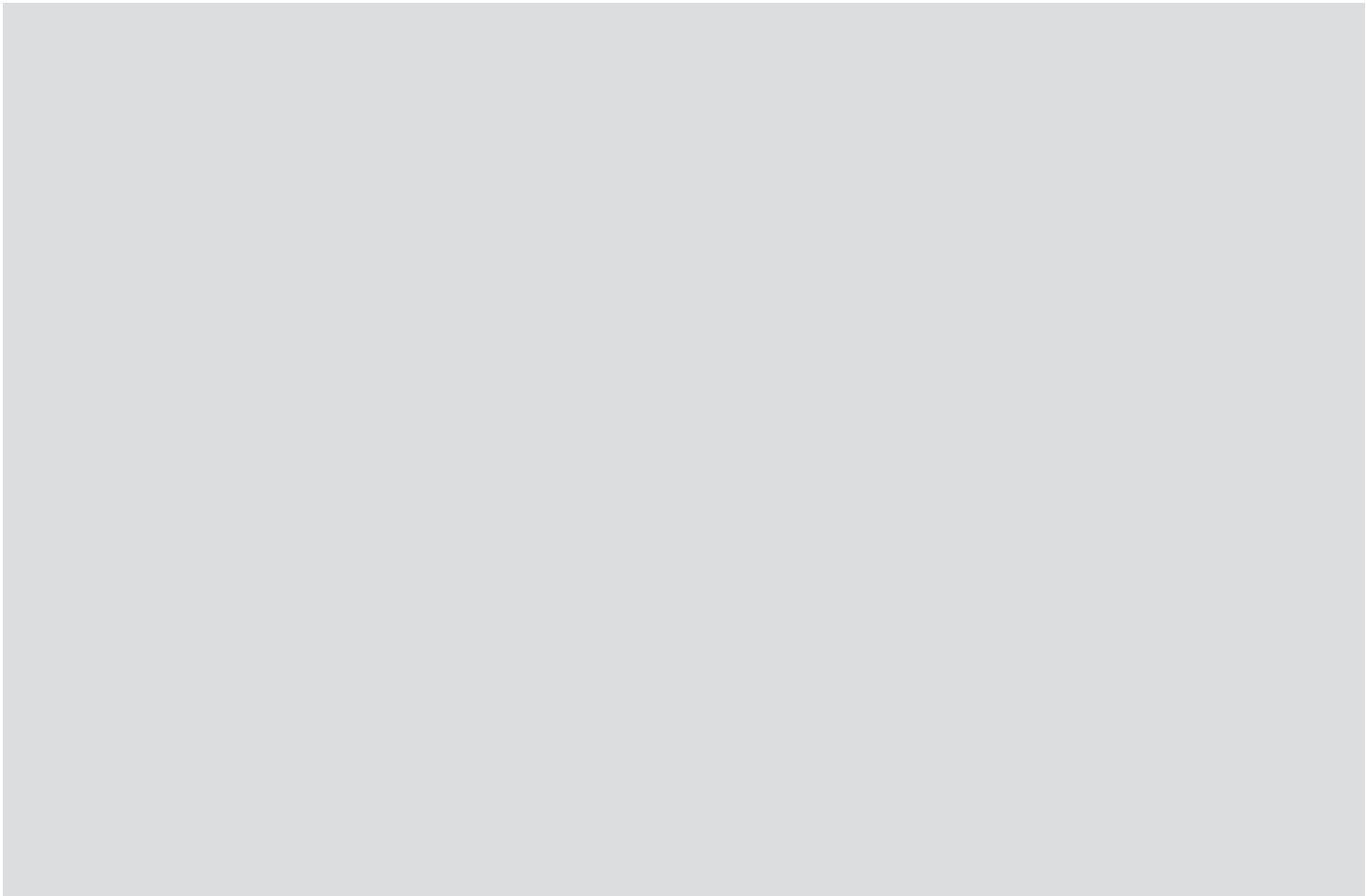
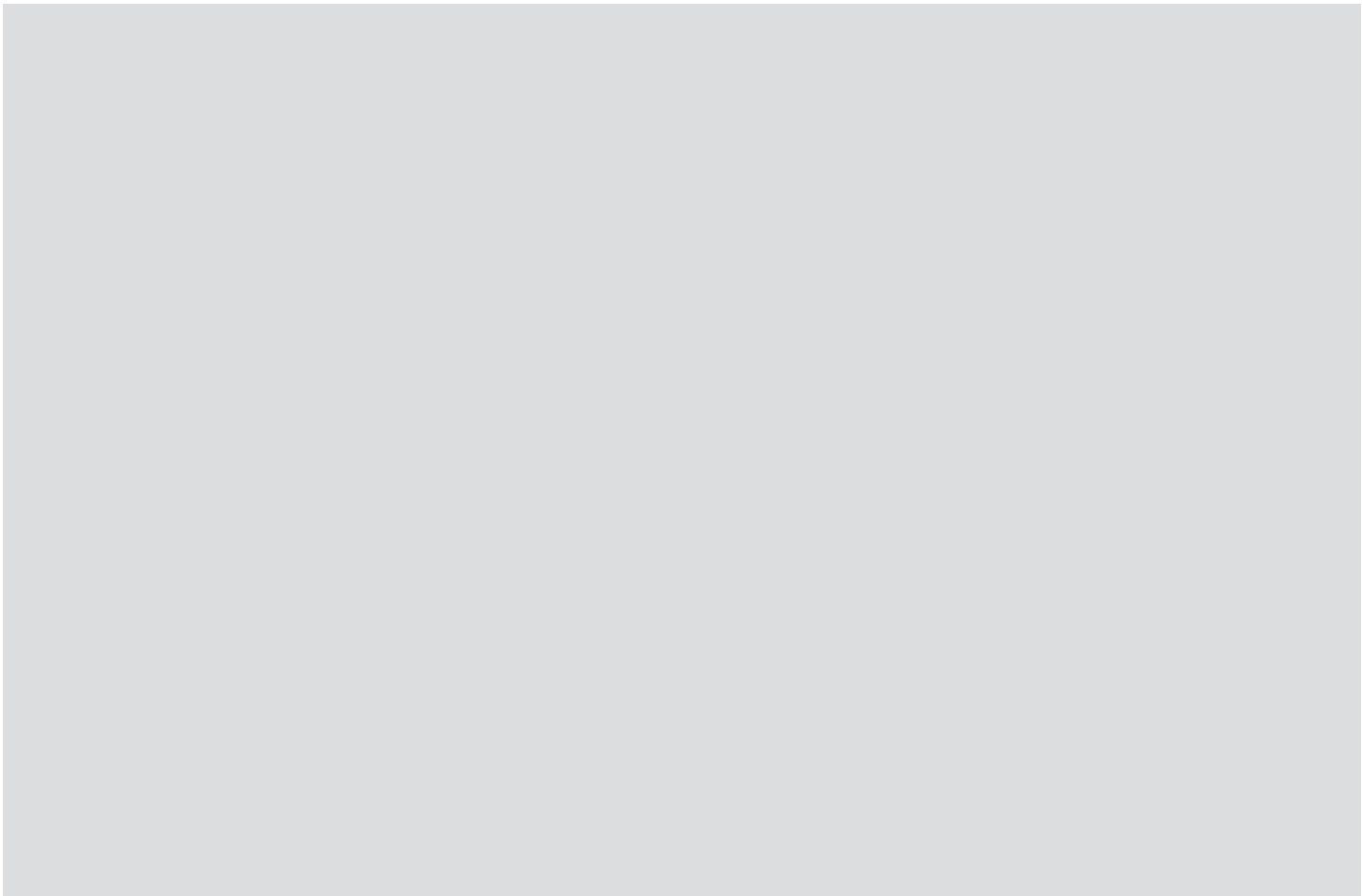
Revised regulations pertaining to sheds and fence setbacks are being drafted by Town staff and a Public Hearing to get resident's input on the proposed changes will be held, prior to any formal changes being adopted. **The public hearing is tentatively scheduled to occur at the Town Board Meeting on Thursday April 21, 2022 at 7:30 PM.**

As the Town of Webster continues to evolve, we as the town government must continue to reevaluate codes and regulations to ensure that they make sense for Webster in 2022 and beyond.

Where Life Keeps Getting Better

With spring approaching, the Village's Department of Public Works (DPW) is busy with winter cleanup, spring plantings, and putting together plans for street improvements to work on over the summer season. Some of the plans involve putting in new sidewalks on Corning Park and South Avenue, and improvement to the circle on Kittelberger Park. The DPW will also be working with the Business Improvement District (BID) to roll out the sidewalk planters along Main Street and fill them with beautiful plants to last through the summer.

As you venture outside into your own yard to clean up from the damage even a light winter can cause, the Village will once again provide the annual spring clean up to our residents. We will sweep the Village one time (week TBD) to collect left over leaves and garden trimmings, in addition to brush. Please keep the woody brush less than 4 inches in diameter and separate from any leafy debris. Unfortunately, we cannot collect rocks, bricks, metal, or lumber. Keep it to "recently living things". Refer to our Village website, which is filled with useful information about the spring cleanup as well as our monthly brush pickup and fall leaf cleanup, .

In addition to spring cleaning, as the weather gets nicer you may want to start some projects around the house. Please bear in mind that there are a number of things you may need a building permit for. Some of those things include, but are not limited to, putting up a shed, a new swimming pool, installing a fence, putting on a new roof, building a deck or any new additions or renovations. In some cases you may need to appear before our Zoning Board of Appeals if your project is outside of our allowed Village Code. Be sure to plan ahead and contact our Building Department with any questions about permits and the process of applying for one.

Lastly, if you're planning a trip or a little getaway, be sure to plan 4-5 months ahead to apply for a passport. A passport allows you to travel anywhere within the US and abroad. Contact the Village Hall at 585-265-3770 to schedule an appointment to apply for a new passport or renew one that you already have. Even if an adult passport has expired, you have up to 5 years after the expiration date to renew it. If you have any questions about passports feel free to give our office a call or check out our website. We are happy to answer any questions you may have.

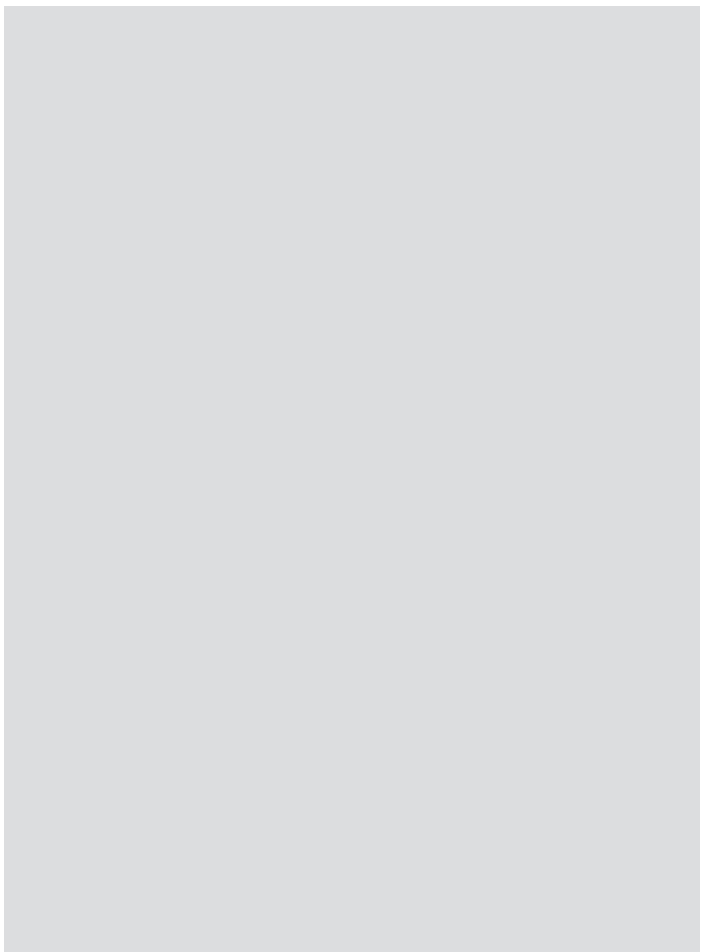

Lake Road Construction Update:

Construction work on Lake Road between Forest Lawn Drive to Bay Road began in mid-March. We are in Year Two of this 2-year Monroe County construction project. This year's construction will involve:



- tree removals/brush clearing
- reshaping banks to prepare for shoulder widening
- reconstruction of the Bay Road intersection
- re-alignment of the Vosburg Road intersection
- removal of the Hojack railroad bridge

Traffic will be maintained on-site during construction using lane closures, shoulder closures and alternating one-way traffic (with flaggers). The project is scheduled to be completed this fall.
