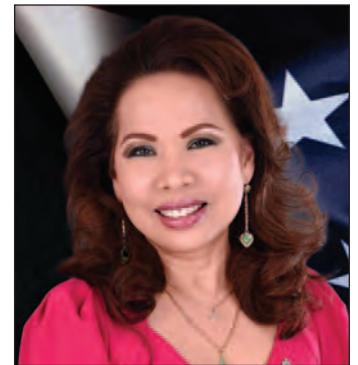

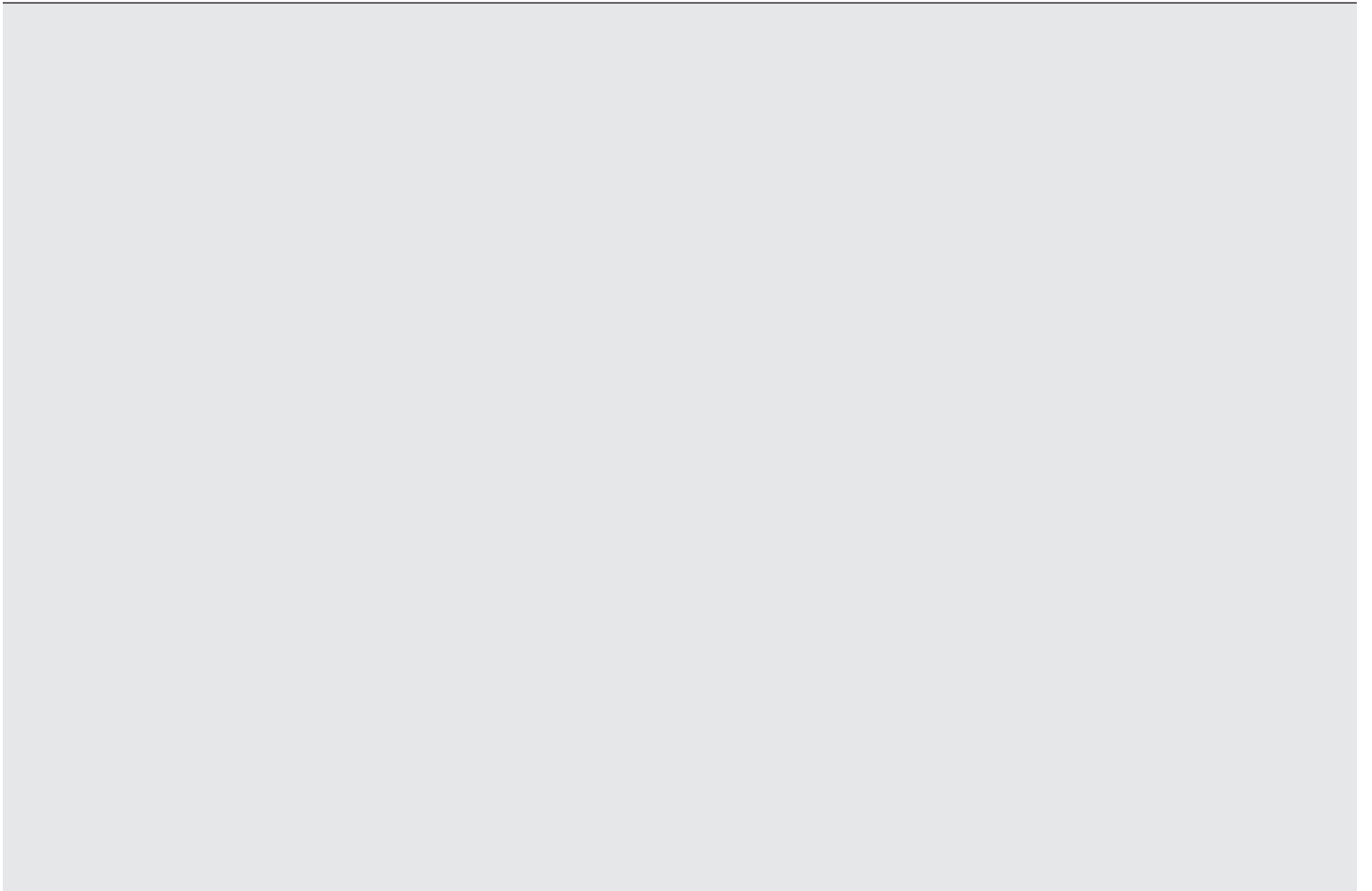
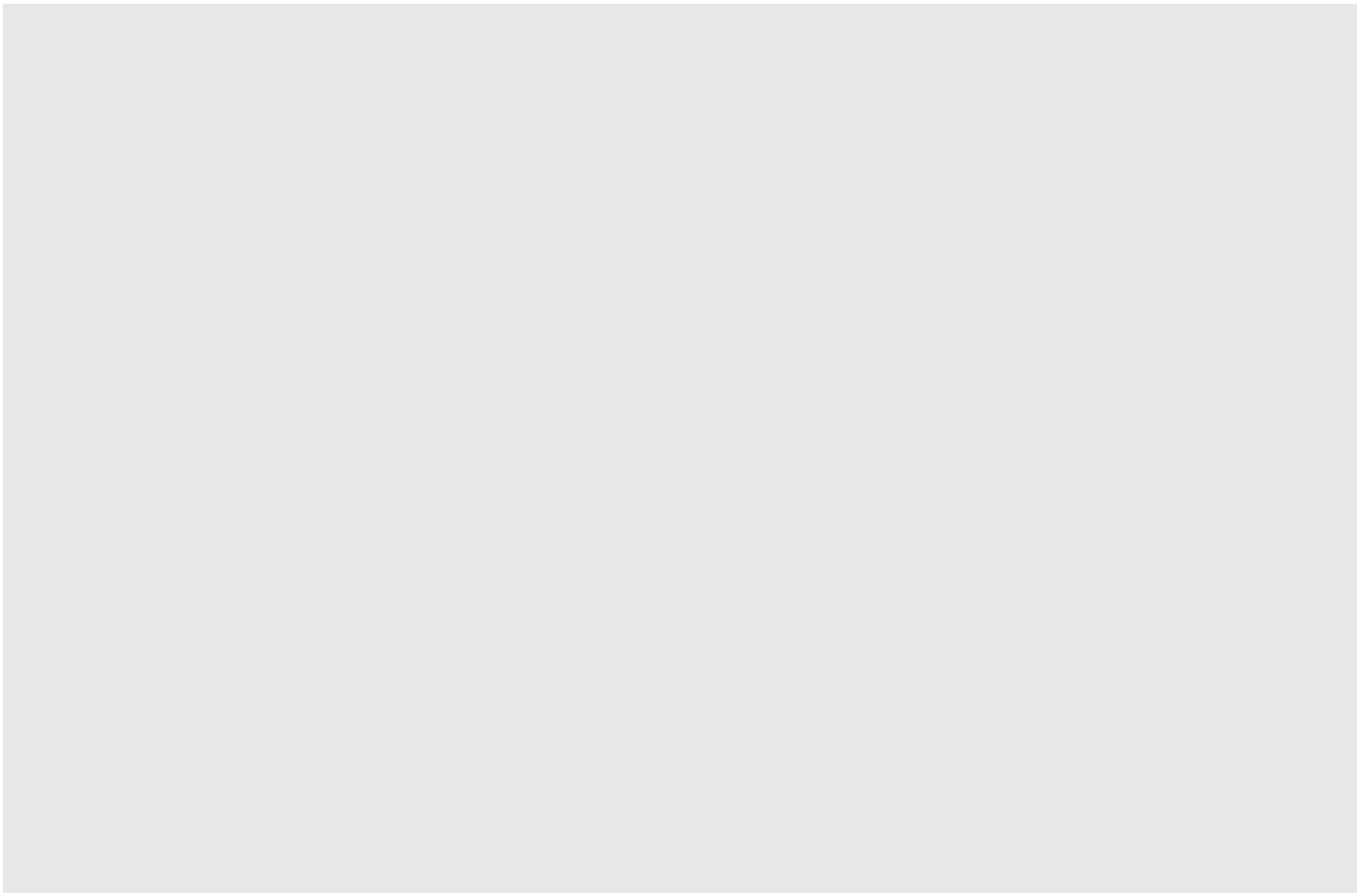

Dog Park

Coming to Webster

Monroe County Executive Adam Bello announced a new dog park will be constructed at Webster Park along Lake Road in the Town of Webster. The project is being funded by a \$250,000 grant secured by Assemblymember Jennifer Lunsford (AD-135).

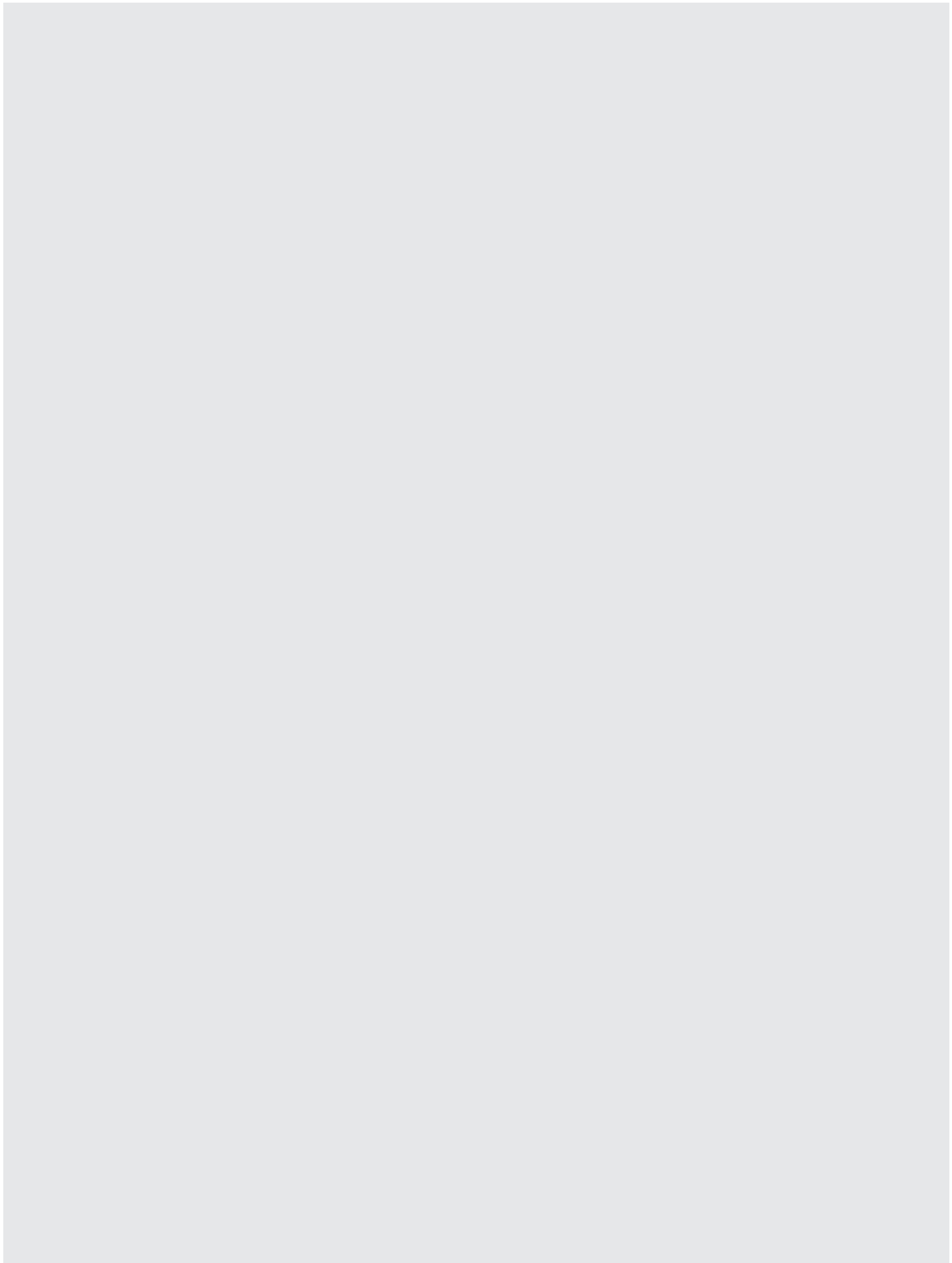
"The addition of a dog park at Webster Park is the latest in our \$16.6 million **Go Outside Monroe Initiative** - which is modernizing our entire parks system with fresh amenities that reflect the needs of our entire community," said County Executive Bello. "Thank you to Assemblymember Lunsford and the Town of Webster for your partnership on this project."

The 1.5-acre dog park will be a grass lot that includes features such as agility equipment and drinking stations. The park will be divided into two areas to separate larger dogs and smaller dogs. Construction is expected to be complete next summer.

Funding secured by Assemblymember Lunsford will also cover costs to repair and replace existing playground equipment near the future dog park.

"Dog parks are the kind of amenity that helps build community while ensuring the safety of our favorite furry residents," said Assemblymember Lunsford. "Dog parks allow dogs and dog-owners alike to enjoy a leash-free park experience. I am happy to have been able to provide state support for the construction of this new space."

"Having a dog park is one of the most requested park amenities from our residents," said Christopher Bilow, Commissioner of Parks and Recreation for the Town of Webster. "Being able to work with the County, which has a proven ability to safely manage dog parks, is a great opportunity to collaborate and bring this idea to fruition for our Webster residents."





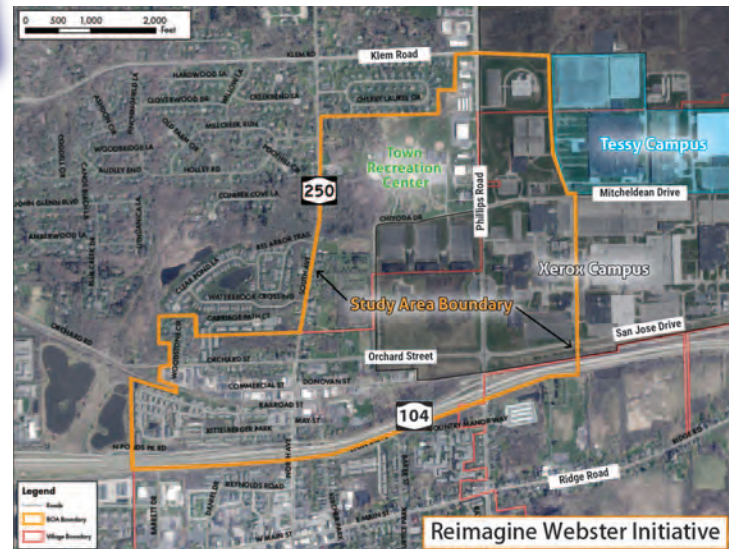
A Message from Mayor Byerts:


So many great and exciting things are happening in our Village and Community.

Continuing into the spring and summer months we are looking forward to the many planned streetscape improvements, flowers, sewer upgrades, Village-focused musical and cultural events, and the continued development of planning grants that will provide a guide to the opportunities for Village improvements as an emerging cultural and entertainment center.

Reimagine Webster Initiative

The Village of Webster has been awarded NYS funding for the creation of a master plan for a large portion of the Village and Town North of Route 104, to include Commercial Street, Donovan Street, North Avenue and portions of the Xerox Campus along Phillips Road (see map below). Referred to as the **Reimagine Webster Initiative**, the project is a joint effort of the Village of Webster and the Webster Economic Development Alliance in cooperation with the Town of Webster. A substantial public engagement effort began in March and will continue throughout the spring and summer – so be on the lookout for opportunities to get involved and help Reimagine this portion of our community! The Master Plan will identify opportunities for new businesses, housing, and supportive commercial development, the improvement of roadways, the expansion of trails and sidewalks, and how the Town's recreation center fits into the vision for this new neighborhood. Upon completion of this master plan the Village, Town and properties within the boundary will be eligible for additional state funding programs for both public and private projects to make the plan a reality. 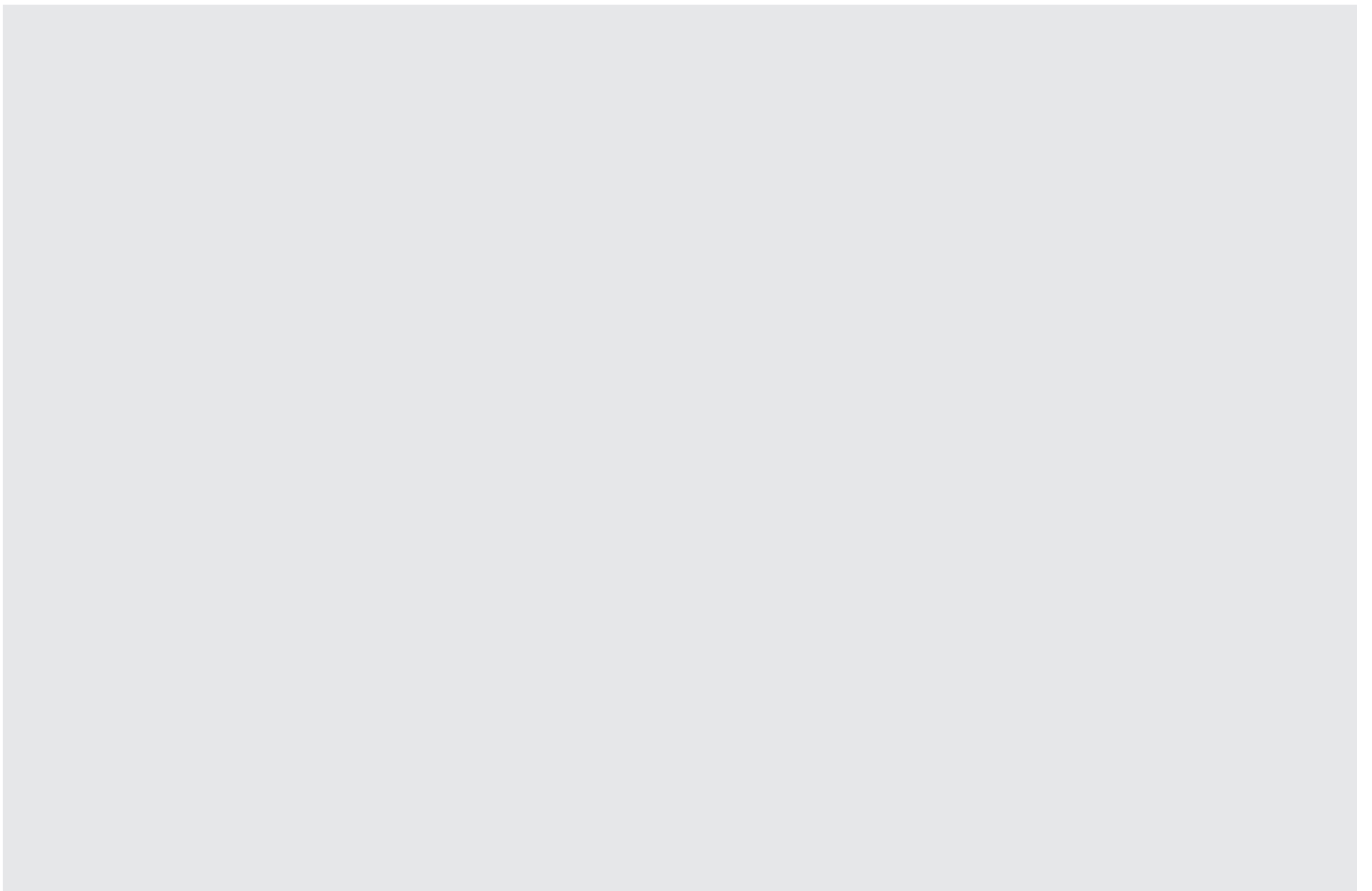
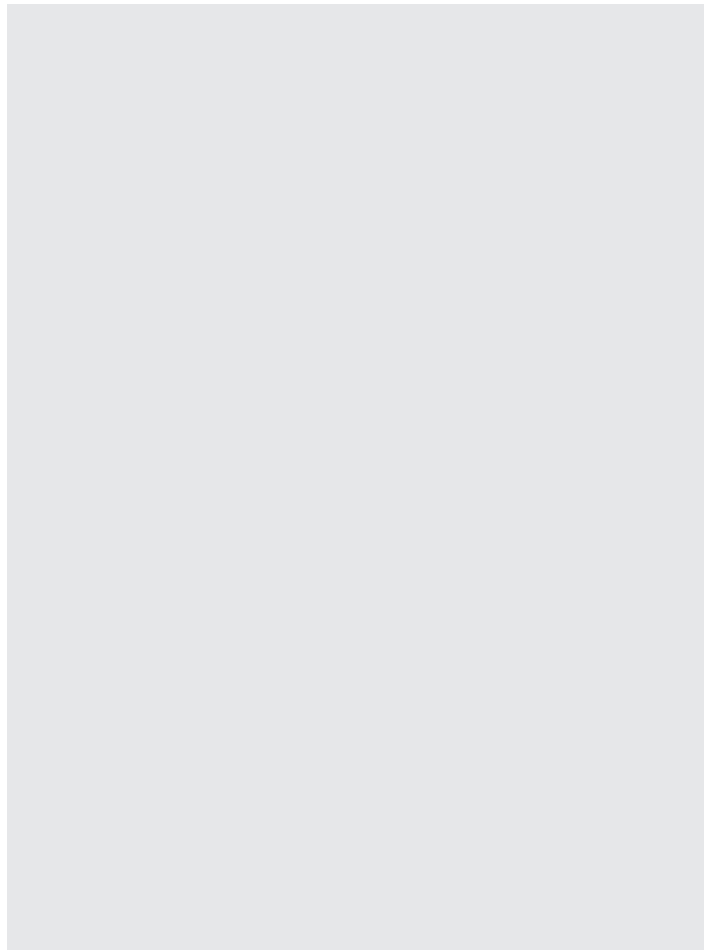
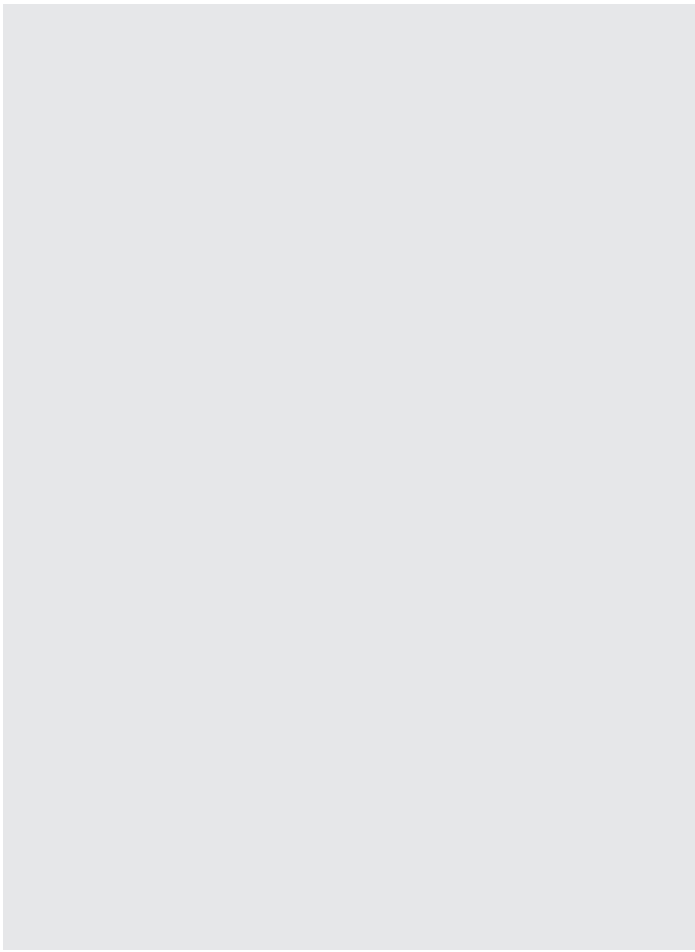

Webster Central School District (WCSD) continues to be an invaluable resource for One Webster students, families, and community members. WCSD offers extensive educational resources for students, universal pre-kindergarten through grade 12, along with outstanding schools/facilities that are open for year-round use by the entire community.

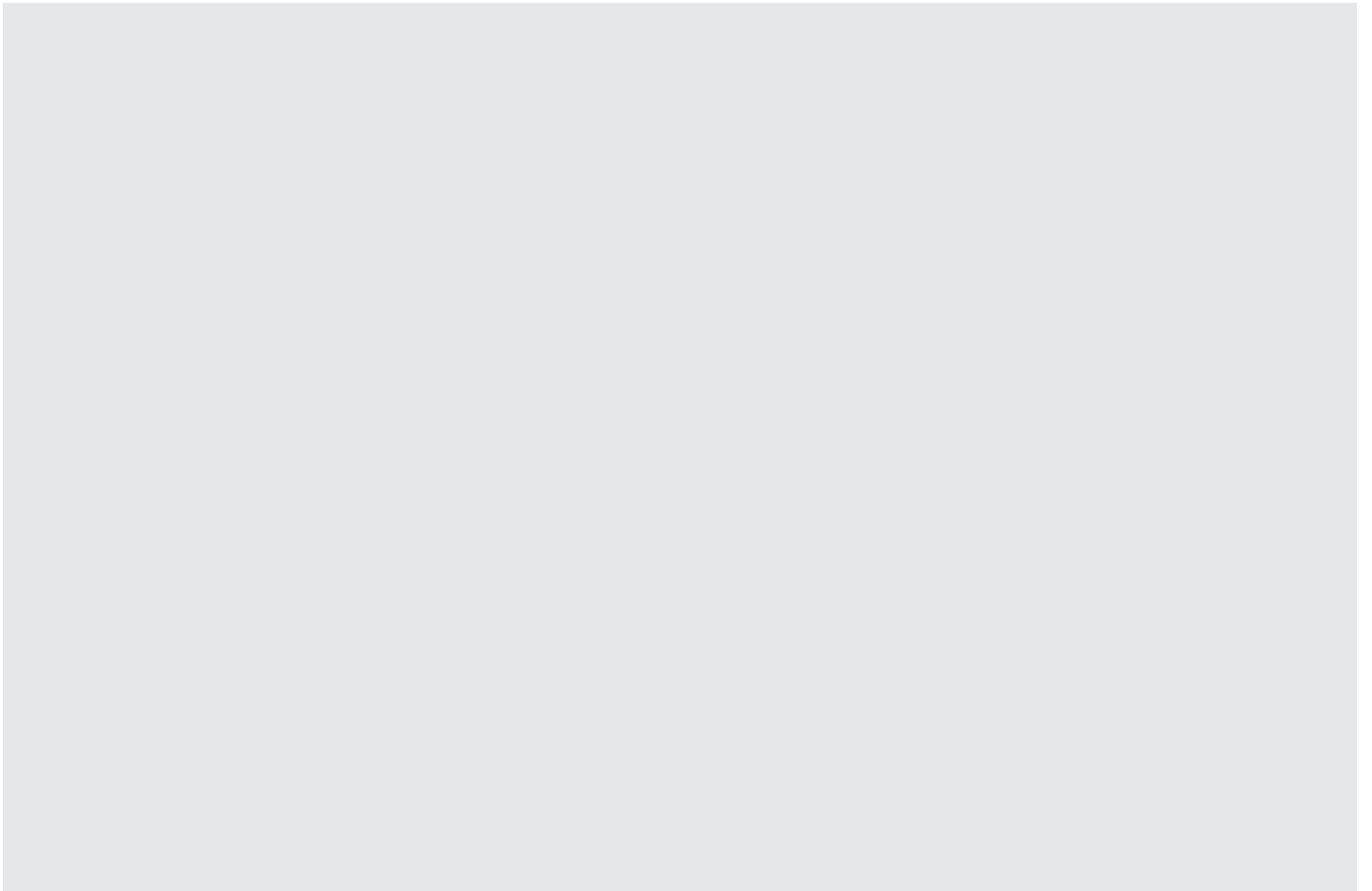
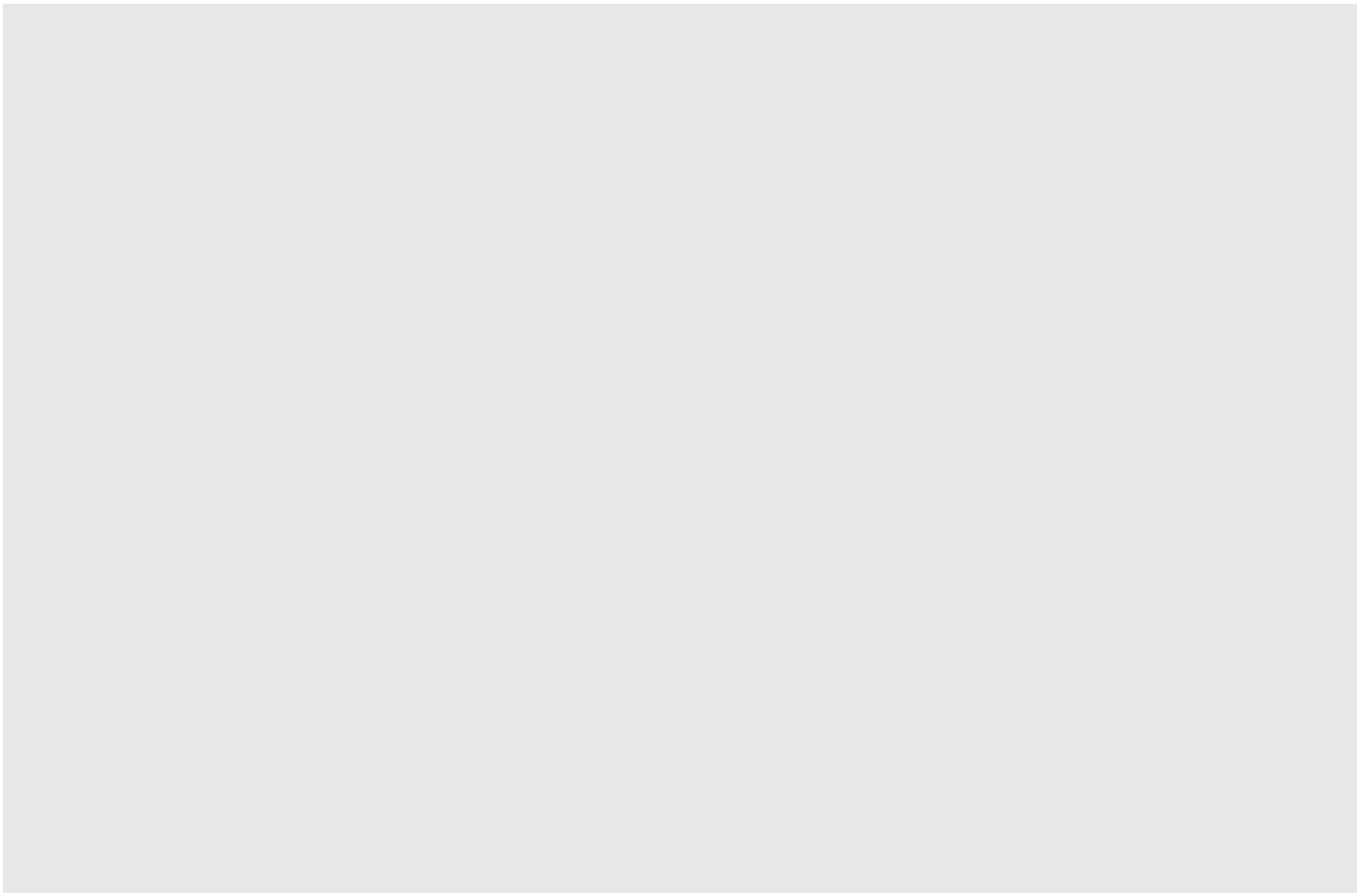


WCSD's WonderCare before and after school program produces countless smiles for students grades K-6.

- WCSD is home to the One Webster Learning (OWL) program for elementary, middle, and high school students. This special education program for students integrates social emotional learning with academics and related services. It enables Webster CSD to keep our students in our buildings, instead of referring them to a program outside of the district. OWL provides students with the same resources that their fellow One Webster peers have – buildings, classrooms, materials – so when students are ready to integrate back into their home school there is less of a transition, it's more of a natural progression. The OWL program began at the elementary level in 2018-19 and has since grown to include programs at the middle school and high school levels.
- The district offers robust community education programming with a variety of enrichment courses in school buildings throughout the year for learners of all ages. Since July 2022, 1,900+ community members have registered for WCSD's community education programs! Driver's education courses and facility rentals are handled by the WCSD Community Education Department, also featured on the district's website, websterschools.org > Departments > Community Education. Program guides are delivered to all WCSD residents three times yearly, in June, August, and December.
- District parents may enroll their children grades K-6 in WonderCare, WCSD's before and after school program. WonderCare ensures that children participate in a developmentally appropriate and enjoyable program that balances and complements the WCSD academic experience. World Class:

Saluting Musicians in Webster and Around the Globe

Over a decade ago, an area music fan wrote a letter to Rochester's daily newspaper and suggested the community consider supporting a regional music hall of fame, which sparked the methodical process which created the Rochester Music Hall of Fame (RMHF). Volunteers united, a charter was created, a list of potential nominees was compiled, fundraising was launched and the project was underway. The first official induction ceremony was held in 2012 at the prestigious Eastman Theatre. The RMHF 10th Anniversary is being celebrated later this month (delayed a bit due to COVID).

The initial list of potential nominees included hundreds of names and it continues to grow, confirming there is a deep, rich pool of talent. In addition to the original list of 'charter inductees,' the RMHF has honored approximately five dozen people to date; two of the previous inductees have deep Webster roots.

Lou Gramm, Class of 2013: This long-time resident of Webster (who now splits his time between here and Florida) began his music career as a member of Rochester's Black

Sheep. After limited commercial success, Gramm responded to a 'help wanted' call when Mick Jones, a veteran British Invasion rocker from the 1960s, was in New York City seeking to craft a new rock band with a new lead singer. Gramm got the job and Foreigner's debut LP hit the charts in 1977. The first album immediately offered a potent 'one-two' punch with the very first two songs - "Feels Like the First Time" and "Cold as Ice."

Each of the next three albums had chart-topping songs including "Hot Blooded," "Double Vision," "Head Games," "Rev On the Red Line" (with a line about racing on Lake Avenue) and "Juke Box Hero" (which was also the title of Gramm's 2013 autobiography). The fifth LP was a 'greatest hits' disc and was the fifth Foreigner album in a row to achieve 5x platinum sales. Gramm released several of his own albums featuring songs such as "Midnight Blue" on his 1987 solo debut but, by the end of the decade, he left Foreigner (although he occasionally reunited with them.) The hectic rock and roll lifestyle eventually led Gramm to be-

come a born-again Christian in the early 1990s and he would perform Christian rock off and on going forward.

He also successfully dealt with a severe health scare in the late 1990s. He announced his retirement by the late 2010s, but did hit the road for several brief tours. As of 2023, he has greatly reduced his touring and recording activities.

Wendy O. Williams, Class of 2016: The family home was on State Road and her early arts and entertainment activities included tap dancing and a stint playing that definitive rock instrument, the clarinet, in her junior high school band. But a new clamorous sound was beckoning her by the time she was in her mid-20s. During the mid to late 1970s, punk rock was scratching, clawing and shoving its way into clubs in key cities including of course New York, London, LA and others and eventually caught the attention of major record companies and creative radio stations.

Even though CBGBs in New York City was a relatively small club, if you played there, you arrived. Talking Heads, Patti Smith, Blondie, the Ramones and numerous other musicians converted first dozens then hundreds, thousands and eventually portions of the world to the sound of punk. When the Plasmatics hit the stage at CBGBs in the late 1970s, lead singer Williams was ready. Her over-the-top stage antics attracted attention but, when it

came to music, she was obviously doing something right: the Grammy's officially acknowledged her power by nominating her for an award in the mid-1980s. Although there were several Plasmatic and solo releases, her time in the musical spotlight was relatively brief. In addition, Williams made sure to find time for her other passions such as advocating for animal rights. Her life ended abruptly in April 1998, but Williams lives on through her music.

The Rochester Music Hall of Fame has been passionately celebrating the music of the region and beyond for over a decade. Plan on attending the 2023 ceremony on Sunday, April 30. For information, including more about the Class of 2023, visit rochestermusic.org.

TIPS from the Assessor: Your Property Deed

**Do you need a copy of your deed,
mortgage, satisfaction of mortgage or
similar property record?**

Some companies offer the service of "finding" your property records, and charge a fee, often \$100 or more, for their services. Such mailings have been circulating for years. But did you know you can obtain certified copies of the records on your own for merely the copy charge, or an unofficial copy for FREE? Look carefully at that offer for services and you will find a legal requirement that they now inform the reader of the ability to obtain a copy directly from the County records office.

According to the [Monroe County Clerk's website](#):

Copies of records are 65¢ per page. A \$1.30 minimum charge is required. The fee for a certified copy is \$5 for a document up to four pages in length, plus a charge of \$1.25 per page for each additional page when applicable. Also, an extra fee of \$5 for every 2 years searched is charged whenever a search of the records is involved.

That's a great savings if you need a certified copy of these important records. But you don't really need help "finding" a document that is not "lost." The Assessment Office records the filing reference of your property deed. A filing reference is in the form of a Book and Page number. Sometimes we are lacking the reference to older deeds, but you can find our references in our online records for **FREE!**

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How?

Get the filing reference from the Assessment Office records and enter it at the Monroe County Online Clerk's website to pull up an electronic copy for **FREE**: <https://www.monroecounty.gov/clerk-records>

Step-by-Step:

Go to the [Assessment](#) pages on the [Town's Website](#). Look for the [Image-Mate Online – Webster NY](#) link in our page options. A new page will open accessing the public records for all properties. Choose the "Click Here for Public Access" button and search for your property. There is lots more to view, but right on that landing page will be your Deed Book and Page reference if we have it recorded. Now go find our [Resources](#) page, and the link for: [Monroe County Online Clerk](#). Follow the instructions for signing in on that site as a guest and enter your "found" reference. If your deed is part of their online database, you can print the document for **FREE**! If you need an official copy, contact the County Clerk and pay the copy fees mentioned above.

It's That Simple!

Why pay over \$100 for what you can do yourself in a matter of minutes, unless you truly need assistance "finding" your deed. In that case, or if you are not savvy on the internet, visit the lobby in our wing at Town Hall for a public computer linked directly to that ImageMate site, or call us and we will be happy to assist you in "finding" your own documents, right in our records.

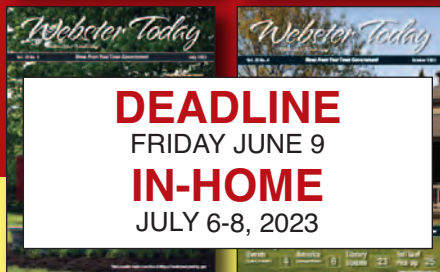

Many Sewer Users Use Their Toilets and Sinks As Garbage Cans.

The Town employs 14 full-time employees and 1 part-time employee and has 22 pump stations throughout Webster that pump sewage to Phillips Road, the main sewage treatment facility.

Did You Know?

The Sewer Department has spent thousands of dollars by having to install grinder pumps, mixers, special equipment and hundreds of hours of overtime a year due to the wrong things being put down toilets and garbage disposals.

How To Dispose of Various Items We Call FOG (Fats, Oil, Grease)

When FOG is dumped down the drain, it forms large, thick grease balls that clog pipes. Clogged pipes can result in sewer backups and spills, create environmental problems, cause traffic tie-ups or even flood homes and businesses. Commercial food-handling facilities contribute greatly to FOG buildup in sewer lines because of the amount of grease used in cooking and other food prep work. Preventing sewer backups from FOG blockages also saves money.

Important! When sewer pipes back up on private property, the homeowner or business owner is responsible for the cleanup.

Can It. Cool It. Throw It Away.

DO: Can the grease! Keep an empty metal can and pour oil and grease into the can. Allow grease to cool in the container before throwing it in the trash.

DO: Wipe before washing. For greasy pans, pour the grease into a container and use a paper towel to wipe out the remaining grease in the pan prior to washing.

DO: Mix liquid vegetable oil with an absorbent material, such as kitty litter or coffee grounds, in a sealable container before throwing it in the trash.

DO: Keep drains clean by pouring 1/2 cup of baking soda down the drain followed by 1/2 cup of white vinegar. Wait 10-15 minutes and then rinse with hot water.

DON'T pour fat, oil or grease down drains or garbage disposals.

DON'T use hot water to rinse grease off cookware, utensils, dishes or surfaces.

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Tips for Businesses Managing FOG

- Strain or filter oil in deep fryers to extend the life of the cooking oil.
- Control the temperature of deep fryers to prevent oil from scorching and extend its life. Less oil in the grease interceptor (grease trap) means money saved in pumping and in new oil purchased.
- Recycle cooking oils and leftover grease into a storage container such as a barrel or bucket. Remember that grease is valuable: grease and oil can be recycled into other useful products. Google “Grease traps” or “Grease” to find grease collection companies or grease trap service providers.
- Instruct staff to be conservative about the use of FOG in food preparation.
- Don’t use your garbage disposal to grind up FOG and flush it down the drain.
- Use dry cleanup methods to reduce water consumption and save money! Remove FOG and food waste from pans by scraping or wiping before using water. Use rubber scrapers to remove FOG from cookware.
- Use absorbent paper/pads to soak up FOG under fryer baskets.
- Use paper towels to wipe down work areas. Cloth towels will accumulate grease that will eventually end up in your drains when washing.

- Minimize the use of dish soap in dishwashing operations. Dish soap emulsifies FOG and enables it to pass through a grease interceptor. It will later coagulate in sewer lines.

- Maintain your grease trap. Many restaurants have a grease trap installed in the kitchen. In order to keep your grease trap working properly, you’ll need to have it cleaned periodically, according to the manufacturer’s specifications.



Let’s Talk Wipes

Despite the labeling on the packaging, flushable wipes and disinfectant wipes do not dissolve like toilet paper and cause huge problems in the sanitary sewer system. They clog toilets, wreak havoc on the Town’s collection system by clogging the pumps at the pump stations and ultimately cost the taxpayer thousands of additional dollars a year and run the risk of sewage backup into your homes. Please dispose of all wipes in the garbage and not down the toilet.

Water is Never New, Only Recycled

It is so important to not put anything into the sanitary sewer system or storm sewer system (the storm also disposes to creeks, streams, and the lake, without any treatment) that doesn’t belong. Recent case studies have shown a sharp rise in pharmaceuticals and other chemicals in our water supply. Our wastewater treatment plant is a biological system, meaning it will clean out exactly what is meant to go into it before being put back into Lake Ontario.
